

non-protected industries. Thus, a repeal of protection would inevitably destroy many of the protected industries, reduce the wages of labor in the remainder, and ultimately in reducing wages and degrading labor everywhere.

The Professor says that "in spite" of protection we are large exporters of farm machinery. Not in spite, but because of it, Professor. And here again I have to thank the Professor for citing an instance of the most perfect and completed work of protection. It secured to our manufacturers a market for farm machinery many times greater and more valuable than the aggregate markets of the earth besides. This invited capital to enter the industry. That accomplished, competition reduced the price to a point within the reach of every farmer. This cheapening process having brought machinery within reach of the many purchasers instead of the few, created again a many-fold, multiplied demand; this in turn created a demand for labor and increased the wages of the laborer. This "excess of wages because of protection" did not rob the farmer, for it cheapened the price of his machinery much faster than it raised the wages of the laborer. And view the result: In 1880, the last census year, the laborer employed upon farm machinery received \$380 per annum, while the general average paid in manufacturing was but \$346; profit on capital employed was 28 per cent. And the farmer was using the best and cheapest machinery of earth, and this without the slightest protection to the business, as the work of protection upon farm machinery is completed. The Professor admits that we are large exporters of machinery; and he has shown that as such our machinery can no more be protected by the nominal duty than can our corn. He will admit that when we can successfully invade the market of any people with any article, ours cannot be successfully in return by them with the same article. When we export any product largely we demonstrate that we produce it cheaper than others; and when we produce cheaper, no tariff on imports can protect us. But it did protect us until protection worked its legitimate end. In the article of farm machinery it has given us national industrial supremacy. It has secured to the farmer protected and permanently cheap machinery; to the laborer high wages and permanent employment, and to capital remunerative return. And who has it benefited for the benefit of another? It has created an industry that is unchained—is widespread—is truly national in its magnitude. It has increased the price of land, raised the value of property, and enriched the people generally who are within reach of the thousands of industrial centers created and sustained by it. A system of free trade that would have invited others to manufacture for us would have lost to us this resulting national prosperity.
