W. A. Little, a young gentleman recruiting his health in Los Angeles, has written to the Philadelphia Bulletin a letter in praise of this beautiful climate. W. A. Dalton was in this office yesterday with the proceeds of work on the Nevada placer mine. He obtained, for the first seven weeks, \$250 worth of gold, although nearly two weeks were consumed in making a road, and his partner, unassisted, the claim is situated 18 miles from the mouth of San Gabriel cañon, and the bench is about 250 feet above the creek.

Major McPherson presented the HERALD yesterday with a fine lot of guavas from the garden of District Attorney C. E. Thom. This is the fruit of the Psidium Pomiferum, a native of the island of Cuba, of a fragrant and peculiar odor, and much esteemed especially in the form of a jelly. Any person doubting the wonderful climate of Los Angeles or California, for raising products of other countries, can see here not only the guava, but the lemon, lime, and numerous tropical fruits.

P. P. Temple, of this city, has just returned from visit of inspection to the oil springs of this county, in company with an old Pennsylvania operator. He is much pleased with the prospect, and, as president of the oil refining company, he called a meeting of the directors yesterday, when an assessment was levied to raise a sufficient sum to erect the refining works. The company now means business. The books are open, and stock can be obtained during the next two weeks. It is thought the gate will then be shut, and no more stock will be had. The work of the oil company, and their project of utilizing the crude petroleum to light the city, is watched on all sides with great interest. How far the latter project may interfere with the rights granted by the city to the gas company, is as yet unknown.

There was trouble yesterday at the Depot, which resulted in the arrest of a drunken man by officer Sands. The inebriate became violent and struck the officer, so that he was obliged to show his pistol. A gentleman, who was present, sends us communication to this office about the ill advised action of the officer in drawing his pistol, and thinks that had he discharged the weapon, some of the bystanders might have been killed.
