Letter from Santa Barbara.

SANTA BARBARA, Dec. 12, 1873.
Our old settlers are rejoicing over the early rains, while the invalid and pleasure seeking portion of our population are feeling somewhat downhearted, and sometimes say bad things about rains.

Mr. Tuttle, of San Francisco, is in town trying to secure suitable rooms for a photographic gallery. It is hoped that he may be able to secure rooms for Santa Barbara was never visited by a better photographer.

The sidewalk business is brisk. Parties on numbers of streets are busy putting down good substantial plank sidewalks.

J. A. Johnson, editor of the Santa Barbara Press, surprised his friends, and not a few of his enemies, by suddenly arriving in town Monday morning, and thereby spoiling a nice "little game" in which certain gentlemen (?) were engaged. We hope Mr. Johnson will always be as fortunate in flanking the plans of his enemies as in this case, and that the Press will prosper in the future as well as it has in the past.

The new jail is in a very bad condition. After the rain of Sunday night some more inches of water came in, covering the whole jail floor. The jailor removed the prisoners, at two o'clock in the morning, into the sheriff's room, and was forced to sit up with them the remainder of the night. It should be said that the "moisture" came in through the thoroughly "water-proof" asphaltum floor.

Mr. Rosenberg, an enterprising citizen of our burg, has established a coal yard in town. He brought down sixty tons of Bellingham coal by the Constantine last Monday, and we understand that it is nearly all taken, and that he will soon have more.

A petition to the legislature to have our municipal form of government changed from that of town government to a city government is in circulation, and is being largely signed by our citizens.

It is understood that Judge Pablo de la Guerra is soon to resign the position of District Judge, a position which he has held for many years. In connection with that a petition is circulating among the lawyers of this District petitioning that Jorvet T. Richardson be appointed to the position upon the resignation of Judge de la Guerra.

Last Sunday evening as the Orizaba was getting alongside the wharf, the runner from the Rutley House, in his haste to get aboard, missed his footing and fell overboard. He "set out" for a pile, to which he clung and cried for help. With some difficulty, and the assistance of friends, he regained the wharf, a "wetter" and a wiser man, minus an overcoat and an umbrella. Next time that man will wait till the gang-plank is off.

There is no statement here, with reference to the new town of Gaudalup, in the upper part of this County. The place is growing fast, and real estate is rapidly advancing. It bids fair to be a place of no small importance to the northern part of our County.

Mrs. Beal & Orr are putting up a building next to R. Choon & Co's store, which we understand, is to be used as a drug store. This will make drug store number three for Santa Barbara.

True, it is a curious winter, to East-ern people, that we are having, for now, in the middle of December, while in the States the ground is covered with snow, and the thermometer indicating zero, here in California, it is any rate in Santa Barbara, plowing and planting gardens seem to be the order of the day, and the hills are putting on their carpet of green and all nature looks fresh.

On the morning of the 11th and 12th we had white frosts, but we do not deny that it was, of course, "a very unusual thing, indeed."
