The "Star" on Sabichi.

Our morning cotemporary having espoused the cause of Mr. SABICHI, proceeds to give him a coat of whitewash, as follows:

Mr. Sabichi is gaining strength. He and his friends point with perfect confidence to his record as a legislator and President of the Council. He has invariably been found voting on the side of the real interests of the city laboring to advance its real interests.

This would read better and perhaps be more effective had the Star always held the same high opinion of Mr. SABICHI's official acts, but unfortunately for its present purpose time was, and until very recently, when it could not see such wonderful merit in the ring's candidate for Mayor.

Mr. SABICHI was a member of the Council at that time and he was one of the marked men. But he is now the candidate of the Gas and Water Companies, selected with special reference to his qualifications for their purpose and because it is hoped he will catch the California vote.

The "Express" Rebuked.

When it deprecates sounding the horn of detraction and letting fly the arrows of slander and vilification, the Star administers an unintentional, no doubt, though merited rebuke to its twin brother, the Express and indirectly warns it that its coarse personal attacks on and false charges against Mr. BEAUDRY are disgusting the people and weakening the cause it is paid to support.

It does an unenviable and exceedingly equivocal position, the Express cannot affect the reputation of any one, and especially of the gentleman on whose head it is now pouring its billingsgate vituperation. We foresaw early in the campaign the style of argument the Express would use against those it was employed to oppose in the city election contest, and we warned it that if it attempted the personal abuse line, it might expect that incidents in its past history which it desired to keep hidden would see the light.

"La Cronica" and the Mayorality. We have paid some attention of late to the course our Spanish cotemporary has pursued in discussing the merits of the three prominent candidates for Mayor—BEAUDRY, TIFFANY and SABICHI. Of Mr. TIFFANY it says:

"Mr. Tiffany, simply supported by the Express, and for whose sake he has been bored with a certain amount of nonsense, probably the wanderings of a diseased imagination, appears to be, in the opinion of that journal, the only man with the necessary qualifications for our next Mayor."

Our Spanish colleague, in a series of well written editorials which we do not quote for want of space, ably criticizes the pretensions of Mr. FRANK P. SABICHI to the suffrages of the voters of Los Angeles. Among other things La Cronica says:

"Mr. Sabichi lacks very much of being the man who should occupy the position of Mayor. In his capacity of Councilman he has on several occasions voted directly against the interests of the community, and at the meeting of the Council last Thursday, he cast his vote in favor of granting more privileges to that grasping monopoly, the Water Company."

"Mr. Sabichi is a progressive man," says our Spanish friend, "but not progressive enough to see that a monopoly is antagonistic to the interests of the people."

"For Mayor we need a man whose moral sense and intelligence is above contamination; we need a man who can coolly calculate the interests of the people, and at the same time vigorously oppose himself to all who may offer to benefit themselves at the public expense; and by his past conduct, we and many more believe that Mr. Sabichi does not possess this virtue, nor even the force of character necessary to oppose himself to any fraudulent plan or to the influence brought to bear on him by the ring."

CHICAGO, November 16th.—A Washington special says a letter from Montgomery, Alabama, received here Saturday, says Judge Goldthwaite, the present Democratic Senator from that State, contemplates resigning on account of ill health, and that the Legislature, which meets on Monday, will probably elect General Morgan as his successor.
