Two new trotters are at the race course—"Hope" and "Thomas H."

The Origata sailed for San Francisco yesterday.

Judge Norton was stricken with paralysis yesterday afternoon.

Major McPherson has broken his leg.

The railroad bridge in the San Fernando line was damaged by the freshet.

The rainfall of Sunday night measured 2.91 inches.

There is more snow at Gordon's Station than has been known for years.

The Senator sails for San Francisco to-day.

The out-going Northern mails will probably be sent by steamer to-day.

The Kalorama may yet be saved, but everything on board has been sacrificed.

During the heavy storm of Sunday night, a lighter went ashore at Wilmington and was wrecked.

It is said that ice was frozen Saturday night to the thickness of a quarter of an inch.

Governor Downey leaves on the Senator to-day for San Francisco, to be gone a week.

Jones & Noyes will sell a lot of household furniture at No. 24 Fort Street, between First and Second to-morrow. There will be an excellent chance to procure goods cheap.

A party just returned from the San Jacinto mountains report an abundance of deer in that section. They saw eleven of these animals in one band.

Mr. S. H. Winters has returned from San Francisco and on Saturday next will open a fine new stock of dry goods at the old stand of Myerstein & Winters, on Main street.

Hon. F. Lambourn has remembered the teachers of Los Angeles by sending them a fine collection of educational documents through Prof. Saxton, Superintendent elect.

The protracted meetings at the Methodist Church have just entered upon the seventh week and continue unabated in interest. Last night, it is said, the meeting was more interesting than any of the preceding.

Two lawyers had a tiff at each other in the District Court yesterday over a five thousand dollar fee. It is pleasant to see these people who are always getting others by the ears sometimes getting caught by the ears themselves.

Adam Magee, the agent and correspondent of the Golden Era, is in town and ready to take subscriptions or advertisements for the oldest literary paper on this coast. Adam is a good boy and the Era is a California institution.

Captain Kraszynski has a fine shotgun at Grebe's saloon, which he proposes to raffle. The barrel is of Damascus steel, highly finished and the piece is considered worth sixty dollars. It will be raffled for \$40, with forty tickets at \$1 each.

Among other places of business that were invaded by waters was Robinson's Palace Shaving Saloon. By 10 o'clock however he was administering to the wants of his customers as though nothing had happened, and will still continue the shave for fifteen cents.

Some water ditches broke over their boundaries and ran down San Pedro street at a furious rate during the heavy rain Sunday night. Don Mateo Keller's cellar under the warehouse was flooded, and some of his fine wine was considerably jostled about. One of the engines went down yesterday morning and pumped the place dry, when it was found that no very serious damage had been done. The Railroad House, farther down the street, was also flooded, and Stansfield, the proprietor, was compelled to move out.

The passengers from San Francisco overland had a stormy time getting down to Los Angeles yesterday. Sunday night they were compelled to lay over at Andrew Station, above the Tunnel, and the house being full, they amused themselves mostly by sitting up all night and listening to the pouring rain. At 9 o'clock yesterday morning they reached the Tunnel and got aboard the train. At a point four miles below San Fernando and they found the track badly undermined and were compelled to put back for materials to repair the damage. By the time this part of the road had been made passable, and they had gone a mile or so further, another worse break was found, and the attempt to bring the train down was abandoned. The passengers and mails were then transferred to two hand-cars and brought to the city. It is said that the road-bed is honey-combed all the way and will need an immense amount of repair.

The Rain Storm.

The storm Sunday night was one of the heaviest of the Winter, Ducommun's gauge indicating 3.95 inches as the fall. At an early hour in the evening the water commenced falling, and continued unceasingly all night, doing much damage in various portions of the city. Owing to the obstructions in the water courses and zanjas many were overflowed or burst, and parts of Alameda street and Aliso street were flooded. Washes are reported on the Southern Pacific road and its branches, sadly interfering with travel. The greatest damage was apparent on Alameda street, near the depot. The warehouse of S. Levy, now in the Sheriff's hands, had about six feet of water in it, totally ruining the weevilled grain stored there. Mr. Keller's warehouse had four feet in the store and about six in the warehouse, while the cellar under the house was full to the floor. Whole tiers of wine casks were floated from their place in the warehouse, but we believe no damage was done. At the Railroad House, opposite the railroad depot, the water came in so fast, that at an early hour this morning Mr. Stansfield, the proprietor, moved his furniture out and took temporary refuge in a house opposite. The first floors of the hotel are now covered with mud and slush, but the water has subsided. All day the engines have been busy pumping the water from Levy's warehouse and Keller's cellars, and we hope by to-morrow, a lighter vent ashore at Wilmington and was wrecked.
