OUR COUNTY OFFICIALS.

The "Outs" and the "Ins"—An Exemplary Set of Officers who retire—How their places are filled—Our prospects fair for a good county government.

Yesterday, the retiring county officials surrendered their leave of office to the successful candidates of last September's election and these public trusts are now mostly in new hands. Perhaps a brief review of the several retiring officers and the present incumbents may not be out of place at this time.

Setting aside all political bias which so often colors newspaper opinions of public officers, we must acknowledge that our county officials who have just concluded their several terms and retired have left behind them unspotted reputations without a single stain. In the discharge of their political duties, such a state of public affairs is something that.

WE MAY WELL BE PROUD OF. We would not bestow praise upon a man because he has simply done his duty, nor laud his honesty because he had an opportunity to do so—such simple probity was expected from him when he was chosen by the people to fill a position of trust. But we may reasonably point to an upright official, when we found one at the command of him as worthy of emulation by every man in a similar position.

Of course, the past county administration was not perfect by any means, but we believe that each member of it discharged his duties in a manner commensurate with his ability. The time will come when our rapidly increasing population, and perhaps it has already arrived, when we must have a more perfect system in our manner of conducting public business in almost every department. But this is a matter which will regulate itself as the exigencies demand. We believe that the new county officers are men of enlarged views, fully up with the times, and they will keep pace with the growth of the country. With a single exception they were all elected on the Democratic ticket. First in the list of county officers we note that of.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY Which has been filled by Mr. Rodney Hudson, Gen. Valney E. Howard, term expired.

General Howard ranks at the head of the Legal profession in California, and is one of the old-time settlers of Los Angeles. No one of our citizens has a fairer or more honored reputation. General Howard, assisted by his son, Mr. Frank Howard, has discharged the trying duties of his office with general satisfaction. Mr. Rodney Hudson, the present incumbent is a young man of great promise as a lawyer and orator, now fills the position of Deputy District Attorney, and we trust that Mr. Hudson will be seconded in his public duties by some able member of the law. In any event, we feel confident that the duties of the position will be well discharged.

SHERIFF. Mr. David W. Alexander, of Wilmington, succeeds to the position of Sheriff. Mr. W. K. Rowland who retires will take with him the high esteem of every citizen of Los Angeles county. He has had to do with criminal affairs of the county at a most critical time, and has proved himself master of the position.

The capture of Sanchez, which virtually broke up the marauding gang of that name, will give Sheriff Rowland's name a place in the history of the State; for, by his shrewd calculation and pre-emptive executive ability, he accomplished a feat which had for years defied the best detective skill of the Pacific.

Don David W. Alexander is one of our oldest and most respected citizens. He has prominently identified himself with the advancement of the county, and we believe, for a number of years has been associated in partnership with Gen. Banning. Mr. Alexander held the office of Sheriff of Los Angeles county some fifteen or sixteen years ago, we are informed, and at that time discharged his duties with marked ability. We promise for him a thorough administration of the criminal affairs of the county.

COUNTY TREASURER. Thos. E. Rowan, who now relinquishes the custody of the county funds, is familiarly known all over the county. He has held this most responsible position for three terms, and there has never been the least irregularity charged against him. He has made himself popular with all who had business with him by his uniform courtesy and willingness to extend universal accommodation. Mr. Rowan, that will some day place him in a much higher position before the people. Mr. P. F. Temple, elected as the successor of Mr. Rowan, is also well known by everybody in the county. By the unfortunate circumstance of the failure of Temple & Workman's bank Mr. Temple was rendered ineligible for his position and the mantle of office has fallen upon Mr. E. F. Spence, one of the assignees of the bank. Mr. Spence, although a comparative stranger in our city, has a fine reputation as one of the leading bankers in the coast, and the county finances will no doubt be carefully managed.

COUNTY CLERK. Mr. A. W. Potts has been elected to succeed himself in the office of County Clerk. This fact of his re-election alone is a sufficient evidence of his integrity and efficiency, as well as the popularity which he has maintained from the first with his constituents. With this term Mr. Potts will have held the office three times in succession. The second time he was offered as a candidate there was no opposition raised against him and he went into office by the unanimous voice of the people. His late election was accomplished by a most overwhelming majority, and must always prove a matter of satisfaction to him.

COUNTY AUDITOR. Mr. Chas. W. Gould, who has for several years held the position of Deputy County Clerk under Mr. Potts, assumes the duties of the newly created office of County Auditor. Mr. Gould had no predecessor and must therefore become a law unto himself. In the political fight of last fall he was victorious on

his own personal popularity and that of his ticket as he did not leave his duties a single day for electioneering purposes. Mr. Gould will do his duty fairly and squarely, and we doubt if there ever will be a complaint entered against him.

COUNTY RECORDER. Mr. Chas. E. Miles will fill the position of County Recorder, vacated by Mr. Gillette. Mr. Gillette has proven himself most thorough in the discharge of the public trust imposed upon him, and he retires from office with unimpaired popularity. Mr. Miles, long known as the Engineer of the City Water Company, will henceforth discharge the duties of his office in a manner that must reflect credit upon his constituents.

ASSESSOR. Mr. A. W. Ryan, formerly of Los Nietos, will succeed Mr. D. Bottler as County Assessor. Mr. Bottler held the office for two terms with credit, and in a position so productive of disputes and difficulties he has acquitted himself without an enemy. Mr. Ryan is a gentleman of large experience and thorough business tact, and we believe that he will make a good officer.

TAX COLLECTOR. This position is taken by Mr. M. Kremer, for several years Clerk of the Boardman Council. Mr. Kremer is very proficient in clerical duties, and his integrity and energy are undisputed. This position, like that of County Auditor is now filled for the first time.
