LOCAL BREVITIES.

The Orizaba arrived Sunday.

Two mails arrived Sunday and one yesterday noon.

The schooner May Queen arrived at Anaheim yesterday from Humboldt.

The schooner Western Home arrived at San Pedro yesterday with lumber for Perry, Woodworth & Co.

We are to have some entertainments from Prof. Plummer, the comic delineator and elocutionist.

The revolutionary documents which were in the possession of Mr. H. H. Harmon have been sold for \$500.

The steamer Los Angeles is due today. She has 108 tons of freight for San Pedro, and 118 tons for San Pedro.

The Gas Movement.

At a meeting of gas consumers held at the "Orient" on Saturday night, the 11th, inst., for the purpose of devising ways and means to obtain a reduction in the cost of gas, the following proceedings were had:

The meeting was organized by the election of J. Whitney as chairman and P. W. Dooner as Secretary.

The Chairman having stated the object of the meeting, the Secretary read the following paper:

WHEREAS, The Gas Company of Los Angeles maintains the rate of seven dollars per 1000 feet for gas and exacts of the consumers payment at the said rate.

WHEREAS, The said exaction has become oppressive and is, as we believe, unreasonable, considered in connection with the cost of production.

WHEREAS, We regard gas-light as a business and one of the first importance and aim to secure the same permanently and at a reasonable cost.

THEREFORE, The undersigned mutually agree that on the first day of April, 1876, or as soon thereafter as practicable, we will resort to the use of all lawful means of illumination, for all the requirements of business, and that we will combine to use the said lamps for the said purpose, to the exclusion of gas for one year thereafter, or until such time as the Los Angeles Gas Company agree to furnish gas at a reasonable rate.

Statistics showing the price of gas in the several towns and cities of the State were submitted with the view of furnishing data for a pro rata valuation of gas in Los Angeles, and a motion to establish the price at four dollars and fifty cents (\$4.50) per thousand feet was carried unanimously.

On motion, a committee of three were appointed to wait upon the officers of the Gas Company and inform them of the action of this meeting; to demand of them the proposed reduction, to obtain their views in relation to this demand, and to report thereon at the next meeting. The Chair appointed Messrs. Dooner, Wolleber and Gerson such committee.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to furnish copies of these proceedings to the several daily newspapers with the view of placing another individual in the possession of the fact that they are published; and to embody in his report an invitation to all consumers of gas in Los Angeles who may not have been apprised of their proceedings, to come in and cooperate.

On motion, the meeting adjourned until Tuesday evening, the 14th inst., at 7 o'clock.
