Free vaccination is to be inaugurated, by order of the Council, Dr. McKee, the Health Officer, being required to do the job.

Ten car loads of telegraph poles went to the front yesterday for the extension of the Atlantic and Pacific line towards Arizona.

The Artesia people will celebrate their Fourth at the place of Mr. Frank Caldwell, two miles North of the school house.

In the depot office at Seven Palms yesterday, the thermometer registered 120 degrees. At Indian Wells it reached 124 in the shade.

The Southern Pacific road are turning out at their Wilmington shops a lot of new passenger, mail and baggage coaches. They are fitted with Miller's patent patent and brake.

The committee appointed by the Southern District Agricultural Association to make arrangements for the coming Fair, are requested to meet at the Fashion Saloon to-day.

The San Bernardino Times of the 15th, says: Mr. A. T. Hawley, a well known journalist, who has been sojourning in San Bernardino for several weeks, will leave in a day or two for a tour among the Coast counties.

We learn that a row occurred at Scharf's store in El Monte, on Friday night, between two Mexicans. One of the combatants had his head badly pounded by a rock in the hands of the other, and his injuries may prove fatal.

The water company will shut off the water at ten o'clock this morning. At six this evening it will be turned on through the new twenty-two inch main, after which we shall have no more of a short supply of water.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Farmers' and Merchants' Bank will take place on the 10th of July prox. A Board of Trustees will be elected and other important business transacted.

A Kingdom for a Horse.

That is what Hancock Johnston said on the 9th inst., when he discovered that his half-thorough-bred colt had been stolen from his premises.

On that eventful morning at early rising, he went out to enjoy a feast of gazing upon his pet and he found his fence broken, and the son of his favorite Crichton vanished.

The colt was five months old, and was a beauty. Officers were put in pursuit, and it was discovered that the animal had been taken away by one Juan Ramirez, with a band of horses to the San Fernando mountains.

After yesterday, the said Ramirez and the colt were captured. The mare was taken out to the band of horses; the colt recognized his maternal friend and followed her back to the city.

Mr. Ramirez was arrested, and brought before Justice Gray, and Thursday at 10 o'clock the trial was called. The prisoner's examination resulted in bonds being given in five hundred dollars, and a continuance until yesterday.

After a tedious examination of witnesses and arguments of counsel the accused was held to appear before the Grand Jury which meets on Monday next. Mr. Johnston has obtained possession of his colt, in a mutilated condition, so far as cropping off mane and tail are concerned, but congratulates himself that the animal is intact in other respects.

"The angel of the flowers one day Beneath a rose tree sleeping lay; That spirit to whose charge is given To bathe young buds in dew from heaven, Awakening from his sweet repose, The angel whispered to the rose: 'O fondest object of my care, Still faintest flower here art thou fair— Ask what thou wilt, 'tis granted thee; Then said the rose, with deepened glow, 'On me another grace bestow— A veil of moss the angel throws— And robed in nature's simplest weed, Could there a flower that rose exceed?'"
