

COMMERCIAL.

Money. The Alexandria Money and Stock markets remain quiet. Street rates for money have not varied since our last report, and the demand and supply remain unchanged. Local stocks are firm, but at present there is very little capital seeking investment in that channel. The New York and Baltimore money markets are still quiet very early—the demand very light, with a large surplus of specie held by the Banks, and rates are quoted at very low figures on first class paper.

Land Warrants are inactive, and are quoted at \$1.00 for 40 acres; \$2.00 for 80; \$3.00 for 120; and \$4.00 for 160.

Congress.

In the Senate, yesterday, Mr. Pearce introduced a resolution for paying the stenographers employed by committees in the Senate; agreed to.

Mr. Wilson introduced a resolution for publishing 60,000 extra copies of the agricultural report of the Commissioner of Patents, for the use of the Senate.

Mr. Bright introduced a bill to continue the office of register of public lands at Vincennes, Indiana.

The Senate resumed the consideration of the private calendar.

In the House of Representatives, the Speaker presented a communication from the Secretary of the Treasury, asking for a loan of fifteen millions of dollars, which was referred to the Committee of Ways and Means.

The resolution from the Committee of Elections for the admission of Messrs. Phelps and Kavanaugh as members from the State of Minnesota, was taken up.

Mr. Washburn, of Me., moved that by common consent the vote be taken to-day, and that the House now proceed to the consideration of the private calendar. Objected to.

Mr. Keitt proposed to postpone the Minnesota subject until to-day, when the question shall be taken; and that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union on one of the General Appropriation bills. He held that this should be done if Congress expected to adjourn on the 7th of June.

Mr. Smith, of Va., remarked that he did not expect that anyhow.

Mr. Keitt, I do. Various motions, were then made, and voted upon by yeas and nays.

Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.—Second Day. WINCHESTER, Va., May 20.—The Convention met pursuant to adjournment, Bishop Meade in the Chair, and was opened with prayer by Bishop Johns.

Clerical delegates not present yesterday, to the number of 25, appeared and took their seats.

Lay delegates not present yesterday, to the number of 17 appeared, their credentials examined by the Committee on Lay delegates, and were admitted on the floor of the House.

The resignation of the Treasurer of the Convention, Wm. H. Hubbard, esq., was received, read, and on motion, was accepted.

On motion of the Rev. C. W. Andrews, D. D., it was resolved unanimously:

That the thanks of the Convention, be and are hereby tendered to Wm. H. Hubbard, esq., for his faithful discharge of the duties of the office as Treasurer of the Convention.

On motion, the House proceeded to the election of Treasurer. Mr. John Stewart, of Richmond, was placed in nomination, and unanimously elected.

The accounts of the late Treasurer of the Convention, were, on motion, referred to the appropriate Committee.

The proceedings of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, were read by the President, Rev. C. B. Dana, and were accepted.

The report of the Committee, appointed at the last Convention, to revise the Canon for the trial of Clergymen, was read by the Chairman, David Holmes Conrad, esq., and accepted, and the consideration of the new Canon made the order of the day for 11 o'clock Friday.

The report of the Episcopal acts of the Rev. Wm. Meade, D. D., for the Convention, was read by him, accepted, and referred to the Committee on the state of the Church.

The report of the assistant Bishop, R. Rev. John Johns, D. D., for the same period, was read by himself, and referred to the same Committee.

A memorial from Barton's Parish, Williamsburg, to the Convention, with reference to the plate now in the Library of the Theological Seminary, of Virginia, which formerly belonged to the church at Jamestown, was referred to a Committee, with instructions to report.

On motion, the House adjourned till Friday at 9 o'clock.

Resolved, That the Board still adheres to the opinion, that it would be greatly to the interest of our Internal Improvements, as well as a great convenience to their customers, not to insist on the prepayment of freight on their several lines of improvement, when goods are destined for the principal towns, or the terminus of the principal lines, or the terminus of the principal lines.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH.

The Richmond correspondent of the Peterburg Express, gives the following account of a mysterious death that occurred in that city on Wednesday night. A watchman was passing along in the neighborhood of Wall street, his attention was attracted by a noise near St. Charles Bar Room, and on going thither, was informed by Mr. Collins, the proprietor, that there was a "subject" for the watch-house lying opposite. The watchman went across the street, and found a man lying on the pavement at the foot of a flight of steps, in front of Russell's stable. He was entirely helpless, and blood was oozing from a wound in his left temple. The man proved to be Mr. Albert G. Hobson, of Henrico, a well known citizen, who had been to town during the day, attending court, and (there is too much reason for doubt) was unfortunately overcome by the tempter which destroys the soul and body. The watchman procured assistance and conveyed him to the lower station house, where he died shortly after.

It is probable that his death was immediately caused by a fall down the flight of steps near which he was found, but the request will disclose all the facts. Mr. Hobson leaves eleven children.

DEATH OF A CENTENARIAN.—An old negro woman known as Nancy, for many years engaged as a saleswoman in the first market square, died a few days since, at the advanced age of 107 years. Up to within a short time of her demise her intellectual faculties were as bright as ever, and nothing seemed to afford her so much pleasure as to recount the incidents of the revolution and the expulsion of the red coats from Yorktown.

Like all old negroes, she had seen and known master George Washington well, and could give a fair description of the atrocities of the traitor Arnold when he attempted to overrun and subdue the outskirts of this section of the country.—Rich. Disp.

THE CROPS AND THE WEATHER.—The month of May has been remarkable this year for its long spells of cold, damp weather.—With scarcely a single exception it has been raining or cloudy the whole month. The effect has been that our farmers are very far behind hand in planting corn, and much that has been planted is spoiled for want of seasonable weather. The wheat, which had made fair a short while since to realize the largest yield ever harvested in this county, is beginning to fall back and already shows the ravages of the fly and the chinch bug.—Charlottesville Advertiser.

HON. WILLIE P. MANGUM.—This gentleman is confined to his home, in Orange, N. C., by paralysis. His legs, from his hips down, are paralyzed, and his tongue is considerably affected in the same way. Mr. Mangum was at one time a prominent member of the old Whig party, and for a number of years represented North Carolina in the U. S. Senate, a portion of the time occupying the honorable position of President pro tem. of that body.—Rich. Examiner.

The completion of the East Tennessee and Virginia Railroad, is already throwing a large travel over the Virginia and Tennessee Railroad from New Orleans and intermediate points, via Memphis. The only remaining link now to fill up is the Lynchburg Extension of the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, which will be completed within the next few months at the furthest, when the Rail will take this course north.

The Court gave the first and third, and refused to give the second instruction, and the trial is not concluded. D. Funsten and R. E. Scott for the plaintiff; F. L. Smith and H. W. THROUGH TICKETS.—The Virginia Central Railroad Company gives notice that through tickets will be issued between Richmond and Baltimore, Washington and Alexandria, at the same rates as the River line. Baggage will be checked through in all cases, and transferred without charge. This arrangement is to go into effect on the 24th inst.

FLY IN THE WHEAT.—We learn that the Hessian fly has made its appearance in the wheat in some part of Prince William County, and is doing considerable damage to the wheat. In other respects however, the prospects for a fine crop is very cheering.

The Old Fellows' Celebration in Washington, on Tuesday next, promises to be grand affair. The procession will include the encampment and grand lodge of the District, with subordinate lodges, and visiting bodies from Alexandria and Baltimore.

The new Steamer George Weems is soon to be put on the line between Baltimore and the Patuxent. Baltimore is also stretching her long arms up the Potomac. A steamboat runs regularly from Baltimore to Port Tobacco creek, and back.

The correspondent of the Baltimore Sun says:—"It is rumored that a line of first-class propellers will be placed on the route between New York and Alexandria and the District cities, under the management of Messrs. Fowle & Co., at no distant day. This, it is presumed, is in connection with the coal and other trade." If the plan be carried out, we will give full particulars hereafter.

Four arrests were made in Washington, on Tuesday, of persons charged with keeping gambling-houses. The accused entered into bail in the sum of \$1,000 each for their appearance at the criminal court.
