Reduction of Army Expenses.

A Board of Army officers has just submitted to the War Department a report upon the practicality of reducing the expenses of our army. It is somewhat singular that the small number of men embodied in our military forces should be the most expensive to support in the world, and the War Department very properly concluded that an inquiry into the fact would do no harm. We have 17,500 men in active service, and they cost somewhere between seven and twenty millions of dollars yearly - the precise number being known for any year until one or two subsequent deficiency bills have been paid and some man of superior sagacity separates the items purposely confused in the account. The conclusions of the board are that the expenses should be larger, and the troops should be withdrawn from remote interior parts to the borders of civilization. Doubtless this would reduce the cost, but it would also reduce the efficiency of the army. The simple presence of one or two companies, well officered, protects a distant settlement or a line of travel, usually without the occurrence of actual hostilities. A well armed body of travelers is safe in any part of the interior, and our outlying posts should be the equivalent of some fifty or a hundred Kit Carson's companies.

Administration Repudiated.
