Arrival of Richard Reelf. Mr. Charles S. Jones, Assistant Doorkeeper of the Senate, returned to this city on Thursday last from his trip to Texas, having in his custody Mr. Richard Reelf, old Brown's Secretary of State, who has already been before the Senate's committee charged with the investigation of Brown's raid at Harper's Ferry. His testimony is thus reported: "Reelf testified that Senator Wilson wrote a letter to Dr. Howe, in 1857 or 1858, stating that he learned from Mr. Forbes that Brown was about to make a raid into some of the Southern States for the purpose of liberating slaves, and that he would use money furnished him by parties in Massachusetts for his Kansas war, to aid him in his new project; and that in his (Wilson's) opinion it was madness in Brown to attempt such a thing, and that he (Howe) must withdraw all means furnished or intended to be furnished him for services in Kansas, if they were to be misapplied in the manner indicated by Forbes."

Reelf testified that Howe sent a copy of Mr. Wilson's letter to Brown, informing the latter that the arms and money which had been furnished him for the protection of the settlers of Kansas, would be withdrawn in consequence of the revelations made by Forbes through Mr. Wilson; that Brown became enraged and abandoned his plan for a while, but some time subsequently pursued some pro-slavery men into Missouri, and carried back with him several slaves. "Senator Wilson has been notified by Senator Mason, that Reelf had alluded to him in his testimony, and notified Mr. Wilson that he could be recalled concerning his (Wilson's) correspondence with Howe, and make such explanation as he pleases. It is understood that Mr. Wilson will appear and state what he knows about the matter."

The Earthquake in the South.—It was announced on Saturday that the shock of an earthquake had been felt in Charleston, Augusta and Macon on Friday night. We learn from the Charleston News that the shock was very sensibly felt in that city and its suburbs.

The direction of the vibration appeared to be from North to South, and the duration from 10 to 12 seconds, accompanied by a slight rumbling noise. What is remarkable is, that the shock was not felt equally in all parts of the city. On the line of East Bay street, the vibratory effect was very marked. At the Post Office it almost amounted to a concussion, while in its central portions no motion, or very little was felt. In the north-eastern portions the alarm was so great that many of the inmates of the houses were ready to run into the street, while at the Hill House and Charleston Hotel, there was little or no oscillation perceived. The difference admits of explanation, we imagine, from the fact that in those portions of the city and suburbs in which the vibratory effect was most evident, the residences affected are built on made land, while in those whose foundations are more solid, the vibration would be little, or not at all perceptible.

CITY COUNCIL, LAST NIGHT.—BOARD OF ALDERMEN.—Present: B. B. Taylor, esq., President; and Messrs. Barton, Lambert, Armstrong and Bryan. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Judge Neale, by permission, addressed the Board on the subject of the application made by him for reduction of assessment, and the report of the Committee on Claims adverse to the application, and that of John Withers, esq., being taken up, Mr. Armstrong contended that in both cases, the rent received by the parties was about 8 per cent on the assessed value, which was the usual rate. Mr. Bryan replied, contending that property ought to be assessed at what it would sell for. The rent was no criterion of the value; half the profit might have to be expended in repairs, or the property might not be rented for six months in the year, or not at all. The whole assessment ought to be uprooted.

Quite a spicy debate ensued, in which Messrs. Armstrong, Bryan and Lambert participated, when Mr. Bryan moved to remit \$20 to the assessed against Judge Neale, and \$40 of that against Mr. Withers, which motion was lost, and the report was adopted. Judge Neale then came within the bar and returned his thanks, formally, to Mr. Bryan, for his exertions in his behalf. Mr. Reid appeared and took his seat. The Board concurred in the action of the Common Council, referring "an act concerning the erection of wooden buildings" to the Committee on General Laws; referring an order for placing flag footways across King st., on the west side of St. Asaph st., to the Committee on streets; adopting an order authorizing the Committee on Public Property, to provide for the sale of the real estate on the market; directing the mayor to visit Annapolis on the business of the transfer of the C. and O. Canal; referring the petition of John Laphan and others for a flagging footway across Royal st., at the South end of the Market House, to the Committee on streets; referring the petition of A. J. MONTGOMERY, January 21.—The House to-day passed, by a large majority, a bill for the charter of a bank in Mobile, with a proviso requiring the stockholders to take an equal amount of stock in the Great Central Railroad from Montgomery to Deatur, Alabama. The bill will probably pass the Senate.

New York, Jan. 24.—Advices from Turks Island of the 7th inst. (Monday) state that the market has been unfavorable during the past week for shipping salt; consequently little has been done. It is estimated that the quantity on hand for some time past three hundred thousand bushels.
