

THE WAR IN PENNSYLVANIA.

[From the Philadelphia Inquirer.]

Advices from Harrisburg up to one o'clock this morning, are to the effect that comparative quiet obtained in front of the city. The Confederates have made no attack as yet, although they remain in the same position assumed on Sunday. Troops were pouring in from all parts of the State.

Six bridges had been burned on the Northern Central Railroad, between York and Goldsboro', in a space of sixteen miles. Much anxiety existed regarding the movements of the Confederates towards the Pennsylvania Railroad, as they appeared to be making efforts to reach it at a point some thirty or forty miles west of Harrisburg.

A special correspondent at Columbia gives a graphic account of the excitement at that place on Sunday night, attendant upon the approach of the Confederates, the fight at Wrightsville and the burning of the long bridge over the Susquehanna. His despatch from Columbia at nine o'clock last night, says that martial law had been proclaimed in the city, and Captain Randall, of the City Troop, was appointed Provost-Marshal. All the citizens were ordered to work on the entrenchments.

Lancaster was greatly exercised yesterday by reports that the Confederates were making signs of an advance upon that place, but the reports proved to be unfounded.

Positive information has been received at Harrisburg that the whole of Gen. Lee's army is between that point and Chambersburg, Lee himself being in direct command of the invading forces.

RAID AT EDWARD'S FERRY.

The Washington Republican, of last evening, says:

"On Sunday afternoon a large cavalry force, belonging to Stuart's, Lee's and Hampton's Confederate commands, captured at Edward's Ferry fifteen barges loaded with government stores, and burned the barges with most of their valuable contents, consisting of rations of all kinds. Besides the stores, 150 colored men were taken off by the Confederates.

Capt. Granger, Chandler, Meredith, and Winchester, of the Commissary department, and Capt. Johnson, of the Quartermaster's department, and Major Duane, of the topographical engineers, were taken prisoners and paroled.

Capt. Granger, on Saturday, fearing some disaster, sent by a special messenger to Washington, \$20,000 government funds.

The private baggage of the officers was carried off.

The depot at Edwards' Ferry had a larger amount of government stores than any other in the Army of the Potomac."

The army purveyor, Moses Sweetser, captured with others, and a large amount of stores, at Annandale, was released on the application of his wife, she as well as her little child being with him. He had just got his goods all well packed in wagons, when they were taken and driven off southward, instead of northward. The following is a copy of the pass which Gen. Lee gave to Sweetser, writing it in a memorandum book of the latter.

"This is to certify that Moses Sweetser is turned loose to go home and behave himself. It is done on account of his defence of a harmless lady.

Alexandria, Va., May 30, 1863.

**WHEREAS** the condition of the city of Alexandria is such, that, unless active steps are taken to insure a proper observance of sanitary rules, the health of the people of the city, and of the troops in the hospitals and neighborhood, will materially suffer, and it appearing that the civil authorities have not the means of placing the city in a proper sanitary condition: Therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in the undersigned, notice is hereby given to all persons owning, residing in, or having the use of any residence, stable, outhouse, or premises, of any description whatsoever, that they are required to have the same thoroughly cleansed in four days from this date of all garbage, manure, &c., &c., the same to be placed in a pile in the centre of the street, or in barrels, before their premises. After the first four days, it will be continued by them from day to day. All persons upon whose premises more than one cart load has accumulated, will be required to remove it at their own expense. All persons failing to comply with this order, will be brought before the Provost Judge, and fined.
