

At an election to-day, for delegates to a "Constitutional Convention" called by the legislature in session in this place, there were cast in this city, up to 2.30 p. m. ninety-four votes, of which S. Ferguson Beach received 94 for "District Delegate," and W. L. Penn 92 for "County delegate." The vote was 35 in the first ward, 6 in the second, 41 in the third, and 12 in the 4th.

It is with regret that we learn of the serious illness of our fellow townsman, George Byran Esq., absent on a visit to Cambridge, on the Eastern shore of Maryland.

It is reported that Dr. Williams, formerly a prominent dentist of this city, died a short time since in Upperville, Va.

Mr. John S. Anderson, messenger of the banking house of L. Johnson & Co., of Washington, was robbed on the street on Friday afternoon last of \$1,015.50, which he had just received from the Bsnk of Washington. Two men hurriedly approached him, one asking him a question and while he turned to answer, the other came violently against him. They both then ran, and Mr. A. immediately found he had been robbed of his wallet containing the money. Chase was given, and one of the parties, who gives his name as George Payne, was captured, but the other escaped with the money.
