

FOREIGN NEWS.

By the arrival of the steamer America at New York, dates to the 20th of January from Liverpool, have been received.

THE DANISH QUESTION.—The Berlin journals assert that Denmark is ready to participate in the Conference proposed by England, provided France will. Thirty-two thousand Prussian troops have been dispatched to Holstein via Hanover, who would cross the Elbe without halting. The Austrian troops for Schleswig, Holstein, were forwarded on the 20th of January by fifty special trains; carrying a thousand men each. It is asserted that the Austrian lower House refuses a ten million credit demanded by the Government for the expenses of the occupation of Schleswig. — The Danes are engaged in breaking up the ice in the Schlei. The London Times, of the 21st, has a report that Denmark has offered to suspend the obnoxious constitution and adds: "If such an offer has really been made, it will avert imminent danger of war." The Austrian force at Schleswig will hardly number 20,000 strong. Its strength has been greatly exaggerated. It is reported that the Saxons and Hanoverians are to be withdrawn from position in Holstein and concentrated in Altonia, in order to allow a free passage for the Austrian and Prussian troops. In case of a war the German armies will require four weeks to collect the necessary strength. By that time the Danish army will be larger than ever, and their fortified works will be able to hold in check an enemy twice as strong.

MISCELLANEOUS.—Three hundred thousand pounds sterling in specie has been sent by the Bank of England to France.

The Confederate loan was 42a44.
The French Admiral Hamelin is dead.
Ten millions of francs were withdrawn from the Bank of France on the 16th.

Forty-eight citizens of Warsaw have requested the Governor to intercede with the Czar for his acceptance of an address expressive of the loyalty of the Warsaw citizens.

The almost immediate return of the Bank of England to 8 per cent. discount rate is looked for.

The Liverpool cotton market is depressed, and lower. Wheat, 2a3d. lower. Flour, dull. Corn brisk at 30a31.

THE LATE GENERAL LYTLE.—A correspondent writes to the Boston Courier: "I cannot refrain from sending you the following extract from a private letter received from a relative of the late Wm. H. Lytle, of Cincinnati. It will speak for itself.

"Cousin Will's sisters were much affected by the kindness with which his remains were treated by the Confederates. A Confederate surgeon, who identified him, cut off some of his hair to send to his sisters. They also sent his private papers, watch, chain and money.— They had his grave marked with a slab, and when the metallic coffin was sent for the body, placed it tenderly in it. They had covered the wounds in his face, first with green leaves, then with with lace-net and a fine cambric handkerchief. His remains were escorted to the lines by sixteen Confederate officers, none under the rank of colonel."

A petition addressed to the U. S. Congress, and signed by nearly the whole of the Washington bar will shortly be presented, asking an increase of the salaries of the Judges of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia.

The provost marshals throughout the U. S., seem to be unusually active of late. Arrivals of deserters in Washington forwarded by them are taking place daily.

Volunteering in Baltimore, it is said has been very active since the last call for half a million more men.
