

POSTSCRIPT!

The New York Express says: The Confederate military authorities have returned to the Federal lines in Louisiana, some three hundred wounded men left on the battle-field. — Fully one hundred and sixty have died while in the hands of the Confederates. The Federal surgeons staying with the wounded bear testimony to the uniform kind treatment received by the Federal wounded from the Confederates. The dead were all buried decently in cemeteries situated near the hospital. Such of the Federals as were sufficiently recovered were sent to Camp Ford, near Tyler, Texas, where the Confederates have some 4,000 prisoners. They also have about 6,000 men, all together, in Texas, and to have captured 3,000 during the late Red River expeditions, exclusive of what they took from Steele.

Before a Military Commission sitting in Baltimore in the case of the United States against John R. Mankin, charged with blockade running, and trading with the South illegally, the Commission decided to receive negro testimony for the first time in Maryland's history, against a white man.

REPORTS FROM THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC.

Some further particulars of the fighting with Wilson's cavalry, intercepted by the Confederates on its return from the raid on the Danville and Richmond road, is brought to Washington by the steamer Vanderbilt. Report says that Wilson had been fighting desperately for three days, and that the Confederates at one time succeeded in capturing a number of his guns—light field pieces, but that he subsequently recaptured them.

Wilson had accomplished the purpose of his raid, viz: destroying a portion of the Richmond and Danville road. On his way back, he found himself surrounded, the only means of getting out being through an almost impenetrable swamp, and some of his force succeeded in getting through, but with considerable loss. He lost, it is reported, several of his wagon trains.

The 6th corps being nearest to the point where Wilson was beleaguered, was immediately sent to his relief, and the 1st brigade of the 2d division, making a charge on the Confederate, recaptured eight guns, without horses however. In this charge Col. John Balair, 98th Pennsylvania, was killed while leading his regiment.

Latest accounts from the front represent the fighting to be going on. The fighting is in the vicinity of Ream's Station on the Weldon Railroad.

NOTICE.

HEADQUARTERS MILITARY GOVERNOR, ALEXANDRIA, Va., June 24, 1864.

THE hot weather, increasing sickness, filthy condition of the streets, and manifest negligence of the people of Alexandria in the matter of policing their premises, render it necessary that the military authority should be interposed to secure a degree of cleanliness in the city that may prevent epidemic disease. It is therefore

ORDERED: 1st. That every civil or military occupant of premises in the corporate limits of the city of Alexandria shall within five days thoroughly clean his or her cellar, yard, gutters, and the street or alley adjoining his or her premises to the middle thereof, and shall keep the same thereafter thoroughly policed.

2d. Each person will be required to remove at his or her own expense to the place designated for that purpose, viz., Near Hunting Creek near south end of Washington street, all garbage, manure or dirt, that has accumulated or that may hereafter accumulate about his or her premises.

3rd. All persons after the expiration of the fifth day, from this date who have not obeyed the above orders will be liable to punishment by the Provost Marshal, who will instruct his chief of Military Police to see to their enforcement.

It is hoped that the instinct of self-preservation alone, will prompt all interested to give immediate attention to the foregoing so that it will be unnecessary for the military authority to inflict the penalty.

NOTICE.

HEADQUARTERS MILITARY GOVERNOR, ALEXANDRIA, Va., June 27, 1864.

THE great and increasing difficulty of supplying the Hospitals, Fire Department and citizens of the city of Alexandria with water from the water works in consequence of the scarcity of water in the stream upon which the supply depends, and the great waste by the unauthorized use of Hose and Fire Plugs demands that the same should be ended.

It is therefore

ORDERED: I. That the Fire Plugs shall be locked.

II. That no one except those connected with the Hospitals, Military Prisons, Fire Department or others especially authorized (and only for Hospitals, Military Prisons, Fire Department or other authorized purposes) shall use Hose or Fire Plugs in connection with the Water Works of the city of Alexandria, and, no one shall permit a waste of water from such works about his or her premises.

III. The Provost Marshal of Alexandria will arrest and punish all found guilty, of a violation of this order, and, will instruct his Chief of Military Police to see to its enforcement.
