

The Southern Finances.

Mr. Trenholm, the Secretary of the Confederate Treasury has written a letter to the Commissioners to fix the prices for four of the States of the Confederacy. "The chief cause of the depreciation of the currency is the distrust of Government securities; and the Secretary undertakes to show that this distrust is without reasonable foundation." He says:

"The entire public debt, funded and unfunded, was on the 1st of July last, about \$1,250,000,000. The expenses from the 1st of July to the 31st of December are estimated at about \$325,000,000, making an aggregate of \$1,575,000,000.

In this amount is included \$250,000,000 of four per cent. bonds, to be issued in place of a like amount of old currency funded under the act of Feb. 17, 1864; but a considerable portion of this sum will be returned into the Treasury under the Tax act; or, in other words, the whole sum produced by the taxation of the present year will be applicable to the reduction of this aggregate of \$1,575,000,000. — Let a liberal allowance, however, be made for opposite contingencies, and let the debt on the 1st of January, 1865, be set down in round numbers at \$1,500,000,000; let the war be supposed to continue, and in its progress add \$500,000,000 more to the national debt, making the aggregate finally \$2,000,000,000. This would entail upon us an annual interest of \$40,000,000." He then argues that the ability of the South to bear this burthen with its resource should not be doubted by any one.
