The New York Tribune, in its editorial columns, contains the following in relation to Peace movements. This article was referred to in debate in the U. S. House of Representatives, Thursday: "We do not know, and have at no time felt, that the rebels are yet prepared to agree to any terms of pacification that our Government would or should deem acceptable; but we can imagine no possible harm that could result from ascertaining precisely what they are ready to do. The recognized object of war, at least among civilized and Christian nations, is an honorable and satisfactory peace; and how are we to know when this end has been rendered attainable, unless we take some means to ascertain?"

Gen. Canby, in a letter on the subject of trade with Southern States, says that if it is carried on in the manner and to the extent claimed by speculators who now control it, the inevitable result, in his judgment, will be to add strength and efficiency to the Confederate armies east and west of the Mississippi, equivalent to an addition of 50,000 men, and will stimulate into active opposition to the successful prosecution of operations at least 10,000 men within the lines.

Horace Greeley and Francis P. Blair, Sr., were in company yesterday in Congress. In course of debate, Mr. Cox, of Ohio, alluded to this as indicating that those two distinguished "pacifators" were still engaged with projects for a visit to Richmond in the interest of peace.

Mr. J. C. Putnam, president of the board of enrollment and provost marshal of the District of Columbia, having resigned his commission, is relieved by Maj. J. R. O'Beirne, 22d Veteran Reserve Corps, who has been appointed acting provost marshal of the District of Columbia.
