NEWS BY TO-DAY'S MAIL.

Eight hundred and thirty bales of cotton were sold in New York yesterday, for \$350,000. This cotton was shipped to New York from Mobile some weeks since, to be sold to purchase blankets for the Confederate prisoners.

It has been determined to commence immediately the construction of a U. S. government arsenal at Rock Island. It will be one of the largest in the world. Its estimated cost will be \$1,500,000.

The U. S. cavalry in the Shenandoah Valley is to be organized into a corps. It is estimated that such organization will reduce the cost of its maintenance one third.

The Old Capitol Prison has been entirely cleared out of Confederate officers and men, several hundred of whom have been sent to Northern prisons within the past few days.

Ass't. Engineer Sam'l. Genter has been dismissed the naval service of the U. S. for cowardice at the time of his capture, and for an officer like conduct while in imprisonment.

Admiral Goldsborough is perfecting the organization of the U. S. fleet for European waters. It will be composed of some of the finest and largest vessels.

It has been directed that in future no officer or enlisted man in the U. S. service shall be committed to the Old Capitol prison, except upon the order of the Secretary of War.

Ohio has ratified the Anti Slavery constitutional amendment. Delaware has rejected it.

Southern Kentucky has a number of oil hunters, with fair prospects of making a discovery of oily symptoms. There have been many leases of lands made the past few weeks.

The celebrated chess player, Paul Morphy, has settled in Illinois. His present avocation is the collection of claims in the United States and State courts.

A lady in Boston recently gave birth to a fine, hearty boy, and the father has determined to name him "Constitutional Amendment!"

The English papers say that the late Encyclical letter of the Pope was drawn up and discussed some time ago by a body of learned ecclesiastics, and subsequently debated at the Congregation of the Holy Office, and fully approved.
