The Hatcher's Run Fight.
HQ'S. ARMY OF NORTHERN VA., }
February 6, 1865. }

Gen. S. Cooper, A. A. G.:
GENERAL: The enemy moved in strong force yesterday to Hatcher's Run. Part of his infantry with Gregg's cavalry, crossed and proceeded on the Vaughn road, the infantry to Cat tail Creek, the cavalry to Dinwiddie Court house, when its advance encountered a portion of our cavalry and retired. In the afternoon part of Hill's and Gordon's troops demonstrated against the enemy on the left of Hatcher's Run, near Armstrong's Mill.—Finding him entrenched, they withdrew after dark.

During the night the force that had advanced beyond the creek returned to it, and were reported to be crossing. This morning Pegram's division moved to the right bank of the creek to reconnoitre, when it was vigorously attacked. The battle was obstinately contested for several hours, but Gen. Pegram being killed while bravely encouraging his men, and Col. Hoffman wounded, some confusion occurred, and the division was pressed back to its original position. Evans' division, ordered by General Gordon to support Pegram's, charged the enemy and forced him back, but was in turn compelled to retire. Mahone's division arriving, the enemy was driven rapidly to his defences on Hatcher's Run. Our loss is reported to be small. That of the enemy not supposed great. R. E. LEE.

U. S. CONGRESS.—In the Senate, yesterday, the general appropriation bill was considered, during which a message was received from the President relating to the recent peace negotiations. The Senate then insisted on its amendment to the deficiency bill, striking out the appropriation of thirty eight thousand dollars for employees of the House, and then added the bill as an amendment to the general appropriation bill. No final action was taken upon the latter.

The House was in session till nearly 4 A. M. on Friday morning, and a quorum having been obtained, the amendment to the internal revenue bill taxing stocks of liquors on hand fifty cents per gallon, was rejected. Yesterday during the consideration of the same bill the President's message was received and debated.
