The committee of the Maryland Legislature to whom the subject was referred, have reported that there is no foundation whatever for any charge, or the rumor of a charge, that any member of the General Assembly has received or been offered a bribe in connection with the election of U. Secretary McCulloch, yesterday, in the course of a response he was making to the formal congratulations of the officials of the department, said in effect that it would be one of his principal objects to favor an early return to the specie standard of trade.

Notwithstanding the refusal of the Senate at the late session to recognize Arkansas by the admission of her senators, they confirmed the nomination of United States attorneys and marshals for the judicial districts of that state.

Mr. Cresswell was yesterday elected by the Legislature of Md., U. S. Senator from that state, by a vote of 93 to 65.

The U. S. Supreme Court closed its recent term, to-day.

The draft in the District of Columbia, was concluded yesterday.

Some shrewd and far-sighted capitalists have turned their attention to the petroleum lands of California, cheaper, and, it is said, richer than those of Pennsylvania, and have succeeded in one case in securing about eighteen thousand acres in one body on which are at present at least twenty natural oil wells, some of them of the largest size.

The imports of Nassau, the great emporium of blockade-runners, were \$1,372,920 in 1861, and \$21,476,580 in 1864. Real estate advanced 400 per cent. during the same time.

The Erie Dispatch tells of a lot of sheep being bitten by a dog in that vicinity, recently, all of which subsequently became rabid and to be shot. Twenty two were thus destroyed.

Mehemet Pashe, Grand Admiral of the Turkish navy, died on the 20th of January, after a brief illness.

The District Attorney of Boston recently testified, that notwithstanding the most strenuous exertions to enforce the Prohibitory Liquor law, there has not been a single conviction for five years.
