**NEWS BY TO-DAY'S MAIL.**

Chief Justice Chase, and others, have left Washington, for a trip to New Orleans, Mobile, and Galveston, if possible; and up the Mississippi to Baton Rouge. Mr. Mellen, of the Treasury Department, of the party, goes to see that the President's proclamation removing restrictions upon commercial intercourse with certain States be fully and promptly carried out.

A dispatch from New Orleans dated the 24th ultimo, says:—"On the 20th instant, Secretary Mallory, of the Confederate Navy Department, delivered himself up to Captain Gibson, U. S. N., at Pensacola."

General Gideon J. Pillow, of Tenn., is said to have requested permission to return to his home at Columbia, and offers to take the amnesty oath and give bonds for his future good conduct.

Yesterday, in compliance with a general order by the Navy Department, all the sailors in the Washington Navy Yard and on vessels there whose terms of enlistment expire on or before the 10th day of July were discharged. There will be quite a number who will leave the service in consequence, as this order applies to several vessels now lying at the Navy Yard.

The remains of President Lincoln will reach Springfield, Illinois, to day. The last of the many demonstrations of public grief will take place in the city of his residence and the capital of his adopted State. It is the wish of Mrs. Lincoln that his body should be deposited in Oak Ridge Cemetery, a beautiful site in the suburbs of Springfield.

Elijah Sills, Auditor of the Treasury for the P. O. Depart., has resigned his position. He has been appointed to the Superintendency of Indian Affairs for the Southern District.—Isaac N. Arnold, late member of the House of Representatives from Illinois, succeeds Mr. Sills as Auditor.

General Butler in an address before the Union Club in New York, on Monday evening, discussed at considerable length the essentials of reconstruction. In his view, they are four: No more slavery; constitutional acknowledgment by each State that there can be no right of secession under our government; repudiation of the war debt of the South; and the complete disfranchisement of all who have held civil or military offices under the Confederate government.

General Grant is addressing himself to the task of reducing the public expenses by cutting off all the superfluities of the military establishment. It is estimated that the number to be taken from the army rolls will be in the neighborhood of four hundred thousand.

Lieut. Dougherty, who was in the command of the detachment of the 15th New York cavalry, which captured Booth and Herrold, has been promoted to a captaincy by a commission from the Governor of New York.

Sergeant Corbett, who shot Booth, has, in obedience to orders, joined his regiment, the 15th N. Y. cavalry.
