The Richmond papers, of all political shades of opinion, speak of the favor with which Gov. Peirpoint's course, since he has been in Richmond, is received by the people of the Commonwealth; generally, and of the universal belief that his policy, as developed, is eminently successful in bringing about a restoration of affairs conducive to the best interests of the State, and to peace, harmony, and the establishment of the constitutional powers of the general government. His appointments of Judges are much commended, and the selection of such men as Mr. Watson and Mr. Marshall will secure an able and upright judiciary. They state, also, that the spirit of conciliation and kindness exhibited, is everywhere met with a corresponding feeling on the part of the people, and that the happiest results may be expected from a continuance of the present policy of the Governor. These testimonials must be gratifying to any man really desirous of seeing all parts of the country again devoted to the pursuits of peace.

VIRGINIA ITEMS.

On the Virginia and Central R. R., a daily mail train is run between Richmond and Staunton, leaving Richmond at 7 A. M. and Staunton at 7:15 A. M.; a night mail train between Richmond and Gordonsville, leaving Richmond at 7:30 P. M. and Gordonsville at 1:30 A. M.; and a tri-weekly mail train, leaving Staunton at 6 A. M. for the West on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. A freight train between Richmond and Staunton connects with freight trains on the Orange and Alexandria railroad for Lynchburg and Alexandria. Freight will be sent to any point on the Orange and Alexandria road without change of cars.

The Lynchburg Virginian notes the arrival of a considerable quantity of flour there, from Baltimore. This is reversing the course of trade, and is caused by the short crop of wheat in Virginia.

We see it stated that an agent of a Polish colony is looking for a location in Virginia. A large Polish emigration to the United States is soon expected.

King George County Court was organized just Thursday. Dr. A. B. Hooe was elected Presiding Justice, Messrs. Christian and Mayo, candidates for Congress, addressed the people.

The cotton factory of Hill, Warren & Co., recently removed to Fredericksburg and now under the management of Mr. J. B. Fitzpatrick, will resume work to-day.

The meeting of the stockholders of the Gordonsville Railway Company will be held in Fredericksburg on Friday. Dr. L. B. Rose, George P. King, and R. W. Adams have been appointed proxies on the part of the State. W. A. Little, Jno. F. Scott, and J. B. Sener, are proxies on behalf of Fredericksburg.

W. H. Effinger has been elected Commonwealth's Attorney in Rockingham county, Va.

Should it be your pleasure to cast your suffrages for me I pledge myself to endeavor to be a faithful Representative, and to do all that lays in my power to promote the best interest of the old Commonwealth, and to pour oil on the troubled waters.
