Mons. Delarue, who did not walk across
 Royal street in this city on a tight rope a week
 or two ago, met with a serious accident in
 Petersburg on Monday. He was tightening
 a rope by means of a pulley, when a cord giv-
 ing way, the block of the pulley was hurled
 towards him with considerable force, striking
 him in the back, knocking him from the wharf
 several feet into the river, and inflicting a se-
 rious injury.

The late Preston King, it is said, purchased
 a twenty-five pound bag of shot a short time
 before his death, which it is supposed he placed
 in his clothing before he threw himself over-
 board.

General Grant is to have a grand reception
 in New York on Friday evening, at the Fifth-
 avenue Hotel.

Of ten companies of V. R. C., stationed in
 the fortifications of Cairo, Illinois, only three
 privates chose to remain. All the officers ex-
 cept one were contrary minded.

Treaties of peace have been concluded with
 nine Indian tribes of the Northwest by two of
 the commission sent to Fort Randall, Dacotah,
 for that purpose.

Mr. C. P. Clinch, special deputy collector,
 has been appointed temporarily to fill the posi-
 tion made vacant by the death of Hon. Preston
 King, Collector of New York.

General McClellan was expected to arrive in
 the steamer Persia, which reached New York
 yesterday, but he was not on board.

The Canadians are distributing small bodies
 of troops along the frontier—to keep a sharp
 lookout for the Fenians, it is supposed.

A Japanese corvette, built in New York, en-
 route for Japan, made Rio Janeiro in twenty-
 eight days from New York.

The Mississippi House of Representatives
 has passed a bill for the support of disabled and
 wounded soldiers.

A fire in Milwaukee, on the night of the 12th
 instat, destroyed an entire block of buildings.

Duff Green, of Alabama, formerly of Wash-
 ington, died at Mobile on the 10th instant.

CORPORATION LAW.—"That the foot pave-
 ments which shall have been made under any
 former law, and which may hereafter be made,
 when the same shall be out of repair, shall be
 repaired at the expense of the proprietors of the
 ground adjoining, and if the same shall not
 be repaired within thirty days after, the Super-
 intendent of Police, shall in writing, require the
 same to be done; it shall be the duty of the said
 Superintendent to have it done, and charge the
 expense to the proprietor, an account of which
 he shall put into the hands of the Collector to
 collect, and if not paid the same shall be collect-
 ed in the same manner as other demands due
 the Corporation are collected."

The above notice was published in the city
 papers for three days, commencing on the 14th
 day of September last. I now wish to state that
 the above law will be promptly enforced, and
 that I will proceed to repair the side walks,
 where needed, at the expense of the property
 holders.
