

LOCAL NEWS.

CIRCUIT COURT.—Friday.—Chas. W. Wat-les appointed guardian ad litem of Mary S. Winslow and David G. Hoxton.

The report of the commissioners in the case of Lucinda Compton vs. Valentine Compton, et al., confirmed, and final decree entered.

Edward Evans, et al., vs. David Evans—in chancery. G. S. Miner appointed to sell the real estate in the proceedings mentioned.

O. W. Meriam vs. Thomas Davy, et al.—in chancery—commissioners' reports confirmed, and payment pro rata to be made to creditors.

Harper and Baldwin vs. H. L. Simpson, et al.—in chancery—F. L. Simpson ordered to pay to complainant \$506.28, with interest, and residue of purchase money due to Central Bank of Virginia.

The estate of Jos. Masters, dec'd, was committed to S. N. Garwood, sheriff, and a suit against the said Masters, by Richard Windsor, is ordered to be revived.

Louis Bann vs. J. J. Wheat & Bro.—suit reinstated.

Shanabrook vs. Fanny Buford and A. L. Randall—judgment of County Court reversed, and new trial awarded.

Armstrong vs. City Council—verdict and judgment against City Council for \$350.

The estate of C. G. Wildman was committed to S. N. Garwood and the suit of Bonnel, Brown, Hall, & Co., revived as to Wildman's administrator.

PROPERTY SALE.—Mr. John H. Parrott, Auctioneer, made the following sales of property on Saturday last: The Cohagan residence on Patrick street, opposite Grace Church, brought, cash, \$1,210; the lot next adjoining, 24 feet 5 1/2 inches front, \$400; the next lot, same front, \$435; the lot corner of Duke and Patrick, 21 feet 8 1/2 inches, \$739—total of the whole, \$2,784. The three first lots are 100 ft. in depth. The last is 88 feet deep.

THE MARKET, this morning, was quite well supplied, with country produce. The prices of meats and vegetables, generally, remain unchanged, from our former quotations, and, it is not necessary, therefore, to repeat them. Country beef continues to be sold at 12 1/4 cts. per lb., by the side or quarter. Butter is as before. Fresh fish scarce and high.

MAGISTRATES' COURT.—On yesterday, the case of John Pifer, for an assault and battery upon the person of Anna Hart, was dismissed by the defendant paying \$6.50—the amount of fine and costs—and giving security in the sum of \$100 to keep the peace for six months.

MAYOR'S OFFICE.—Jimmy Burke was brought up, to-day, for disorderly conduct, and dismissed on promise not to offend again.

We mentioned in yesterday's Gazette the arrival of the late Confederate steamer Stone-wall at Washington. On her way to the Potomac, on Wednesday morning, she ran into the schooner Wm. Carleton, from Baltimore, with 290 tons of coal. She was moving only at the rate of four knots at the time, but her beak penetrated the schooner a distance of twenty-three feet, running through her as if she had been past board and sinking her instantly. All of the crew were saved. Her engines were reversed as soon as the schooner was perceived, but it was too late to save her.

Dewitt, proceed to ascertain from the books of the company the name of every stockholder, with the amount subscribed and the amount paid, as shown by the books and the records, and that Messrs. Quigley and Jamieson be directed to keep possession of and run the road as heretofore until further orders.

C. & O. CANAL.—The revenue for the month of October exceeds \$52,000 and but for the temporary interruptions by breaks the company would have realized for the present year \$400,000. Orders have been issued to close operations for the season on the 15th day of December.

The remains of our former respected fellow citizen, Robert E. Buchanan, who died at Brandy Station, Va., in August 1861, were removed from that place, and brought to this city, and interred yesterday morning.
