FRENCH ENTERPRISE IN VIRGINIA.—If we are not very much mistaken, the arrangements which have recently been completed in Virginia by Messrs. Bellet des Minieres & Company, will do more to "restore the prestige of the Latin races in America" than twenty Maximilians. These French capitalists, who are proprietors of vast tracts of land in the Old Dominion, including extensive coal and iron fields, have succeeded at last in obtaining a charter from both the Virginia Legislature, entitling them to complete the James River and Kanawha Canal, that property having passed into their hands. By means of this great original corporation, by means of this great work, the Ohio will be connected with the seaboard, and a safe, cheap, and very direct communication be opened up to the West. Nor is this all. France needs coal, iron, ship timber, and these are to be found in immense quantities along the line of the proposed highway. It is the intention of the French company to avail itself of these resources and with the active co-operation of the home government to proceed at once, as soon as the canal shall be cut through, to a systematic development of the untold mineral and agricultural wealth of the Allegheny region.—N. Y. Post.
