At the advanced age of eighty, Dr. Gardner Spring, for fifty-five years pastor of the "Old Brick Presbyterian Church" in New York, has published two volumes of "Personal Reminiscences." It was his misfortune in 1860 to lose the first Mrs. Spring, who, he informs us in his diary, "was his wife for fifty-four years," and whose death "left a vacuum in his life which time cannot fill." The Doctor managed, by the exercise of great Christian fortitude, to survive the irreparable loss, and eight pages further on in his "diary," at the age of eighty, states the process by which the "vacuum in his existence" was satisfactorily filled. The following extract from the "diary" will show how the thing was done:

"April 13, 1865.—My sweet wife (that is No. 1) was too valuable a woman ever to be forgotten. The preceding sketch furnishes but the outline of her excellences, which I have presented more at large at the close of the sermon commemorative of one who was my first love. I never thought I could love another. But I was advanced beyond my threescore years and ten, partially blind, and needed a helper, fitted to my age and condition; no one needs such a helper more than a man in his advanced years. I sought, and God gave me another wife. A few days only more than a year after the death of Mrs. Spring, on the 14th of August, 1861, I was married to Abba Grosvenor Williams, the only surviving child of the late Elisha Williams, esq., a distinguished member of the bar. She is the heiress of a large property, and retains it in her own hands. She is intent on her duty as a wife, watchful of my wants, takes good care of me, is an excellent house keeper, and instead of adding to the expenses of my household, shares them with her husband."—Vol. II, p. 91, 92

A QUEER COINCIDENCE.—A recent issue of the Harrisburg Telegraph contains the following reference to President Johnson:

"We did not condemn his veto of the Freedmen's Bureau bill, because we could not then believe that he had deliberately made up his mind to become a traitor to those who made him what he is. We turned in pity from his incoherent harangue to the rabid secessionists of Washington city on the 22d of February. But we now owe it to the good of the country—to the honor of our friends and the sacredness of the great principles in support of which we have spent the best days of our life, no longer to pass by with indifference or with seeming approval the acts of a man who begins to prove not only false to himself, but false to humanity, his country, and his God!"

It is a funny coincidence that the scales only fell from the eyes of this confiding victim of Executive treachery on the day when he received "notice to quit," the postoffice which he has held for five years. When you say of a man in the radical dialect, that "he is false to humanity, his country, and his God," it means ordinary English that he has either put you out of an office or has refused to give you one.—Philadelphia Age.
