CONFLICT OF JURISDICTION IN PETERSBURG.—Some time ago a young man named Elliott Gordon, of New Bedford, Mass., arrived in Petersburg, and registered under a false name at the Bellingbrook Hotel. Not long after his arrival he went to Bob Clarke's lively stable and hired a horse and buggy, to enable him, as he alleged, to visit his parents in the county of Prince George. He left the city and was gone some days, when Clarke, alarmed for the safety of his property, sent an officer after Gordon, who overtook him in Surry county, where he had endeavored in vain to dispose of the horse and buggy, and brought him to Petersburg. He was produced before the Mayor, and by him committed to stand his examination at the term of the Hustings Court just past, but for want of a material witness his case lies over.

In this condition of affairs a petition is forwarded to General Howard, Superintendent of the Freedmen's Bureau, by Hon. Thomas D. Elliott, M. C. from the New Bedford District, in Massachusetts, praying that the culprit be taken out of the custody of the civil authorities of the State of Virginia, whose laws he has violated and turned over to the military.

General Howard has returned this application to Col. Brown, Assistant Commissioner of Freedmen, &c., at Richmond. It was endorsed by Col. Brown, and forwarded to Gov. Peirpoint, who approved it, and with his approval sent up to Gen. Terry, who referred it to Lieut. Col. Anderson, commanding this post, with instructions to turn the prisoner over to Captain Barnes, and Capt. Barnes was directed to forward him to Col. Brown, with all the evidence in the case.

The order was served upon the Sergeant of the city, who, in view of his heavy bonds and responsibilities, declined to accede to it, and there the matter rested last night.

Col. Anderson went to Richmond yesterday with the view of further consultation with Gen. Terry, but as he had not returned at this writing—8 o'clock—we are not informed of the result.

The above we understand, are the facts of the case. If the prisoner is returned, it will have to be done by force, and such action is involved with much interest and delicacy.—Petersburg Index.
