The Texas Convention passed a resolution providing for the purchase of a full length likeness of General Houston, to be placed in the Hall of their Capitol. The Charleston South Carolina makes this the theme of the following remarks:

It is correctly taken, it will be a splendid picture. General Houston, in his prime, was one of the handsomest men in the United States. He was tall, well shaped, with a very handsome countenance, and of a manly and courteous bearing. He was always eccentric in his dress and fond of changing its style. One day he would appear in a jeans hunting-shirt, and the next in the finest to be made.

After his domestic difficulties in Tennessee, he went among the Indians and lived with them. They made him a chief. His habits, however, were so bad that, naming him by his characteristics, as is the Indian fashion, they called him the "Big Drink." Later he became a great advocate of total abstinence, although he fell into occasional aberration. He was accustomed to remark that he felt himself a traitor in this particular that he never went into any society into which he could not take his wife. His second marriage was a happy one.

When it used to be said of any runaway delinquent that he had G. T. T. (gone to Texas) Gen. Houston made a temperance speech in England, and after admitting that there was a great deal of intemperance in Texas, and a great many scoundrels there, he accounted for it by saying that the Eastern emigration to his State had been so very large.

Houston's intercourse with men in every variety of scene has given him great knowledge of mankind. He used to say that there was a great deal in a word—quoting Mirabeau, "that words were things." "For instance," he would remark, "in my despatches in the Texas war you will find that I say after a Texas man we will back to such or such a place. I never said retreated."

Houston's admiration for General Jackson was unbounded. He generally called him "the old chief," and was fond of telling anecdotes of him, which were racy and original, and he told them with much point and dramatic effect. With the progress of civilization and fixed conventional habits in the new States, characters of the Houston stamp will entirely disappear, as did the character of the old boatman after the appearance of the steamboats on the Western waters. But General Houston will always occupy a conspicuous place in history, not only as the great soldier and leader in Texas independence, the first President of the Lone Star and her first Senator in Congress.

DESTRUCTION OF VALPARAISO, &c.—The steamer New York, Aspinwall on the 2d, has arrived.

Letters remain perfectly quiet at Valparaiso since the bombardment. All the Spanish fleet except the B-Regals has sailed for northern ports. Nothing had been heard of the Heister or Independence, and the Prussia-sloop Union and America have sailed towards the Straits to meet them.

The Danish Consul General sent a note to the Spanish Admiral, saying that his government could hold Spain responsible for her damages to Danish property in Valparaiso, but the Admiral refused to receive his note.

Immediately after the bombardment of Valparaiso, the English minister was requested to receive the English minister occupied by him, and no one else would be admitted to the house. His name has also been struck from the list of members of the Club de la Union.

Only two lives were lost and eight wounded by the bombardment. Several churches were destroyed, and one hundred and fifty-one government stores, valued at half a million of dollars, containing upwards of \$8,000,000 worth of British merchandise. Five hundred and forty-nine thousand dollars will repair all the damage done to public edifices, whilst the bulk of the loss will fall on foreigners.

The Celano preparations were actively making for the departure of the Spanish fleet, by erecting fortifications.

Speaking of the Merchants' National Bank in Washington, the Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun says: "It is now ascertained that the bank had on deposit of government funds from the Interior Department, on account of Indian lands, \$22,937; Postoffice Department, cash-letter fund, waste paper fund and disbursing clerk, \$9,000; Treasury Department, \$5,480 and paymasters and quartermasters, \$560,133—total, \$387,000. Treasurer Critcher, it is stated, holds about the amount necessary for the redemption of the notes of the bank about \$140,000, leaving a loss for the government of \$347,000, without having recourse to the stockholders, or counting upon the probable return of a large portion of the notes of the bank, or the bank recovering or having anything from the general assets of the concern. The official inquiry now going on will soon demonstrate the amount of the private deposits, their liabilities and assets. Information from Baltimore indicates that nothing of any account will be recovered from Payne, or Payne & Co., of Baltimore.

The following is the list of a series of resolutions passed by the Union men of Brooklyn, New York, at a recent meeting. The dividing line is drawn just exactly where it should be:

Resolved, That we hold, irrespective of the sect, all men now to be loyal, who are earnest in their endeavors to bring the States to peace, distinct like the waves, but one like the sea, and that we hold all men to be disloyal who, under any pretext, stand in the way of the re-nomination of all our efforts and our sacrifices.
