The following account is given in the National Intelligencer of the recent speech of "Rev. J. W. Alvord, General Inspector of Colored Schools under the Freedmen's Bureau," recently made in Washington, at a meeting of a number of Teachers of Colored Schools:—

"His effort did not favorably impress us. He had been, he said, in the work of colored school teaching for thirty years, and seemed by this statement to claim something more than common deference to his self-denial and wisdom in the work. He had been all over the South, among the colored schools in Chesapeake, Savannah, New Orleans, and elsewhere, and had, in his journeyings, been looking for the best specimen of a colored school. They were all so excellent, however, that he had not yet decided which was best. We expected at this point that he would turn to his personal observations in the schools, and furnish an interesting and valuable entertainment to the teachers and all others on the direct subject which occasioned the meeting. He did as such thing. With some sweeping vituperation upon the temper and designs of the Southern people, he planted his contemplation upon the city of Washington.

"The colored population of this city, he said, had wonderfully improved in character and appearance during the war. It could be seen on the streets, at the church, and everywhere. This very preposterous statement was evidence that he was utterly ignorant of the subject upon which he was attempting to enlighten an intelligent audience. It is absurdly untrue to represent the colored population of this city now as equal in their industry, intelligence, and correctness of life to those who were here before the war. The poor, beset, miserable creatures who have thronged to this city during the war are not to be compared with those colored servants and free colored people who were here when the war opened, and it is only great ignorance, stupidity, or fanaticism, or all combined, that will suggest the absurdity. Rev. Mr. Alvord, however, when he comes to "inspect" white people in Washington, looks through another pair of spectacles. Many places were improved in their morals during the war, and had become demoralized. And then with a long, loose digression, in the same senseless stragglers in regard to the colored people, he went on to show how Washington had become a "heterogeneous conglomeration" of loafers, rascals, and rascals. We write with no unkind spirit in regard to his gentleman. He was sincere in his views, no doubt, and thought he was doing the cause of colored schools a service in his very foolish speech. Everybody knows, who knows anything about the Washington population, that his assertions upon the white population of this city are without foundation. The moral and intellectual life of Washington has been less demoralized, in our judgment, during the war than the average of Northern cities, and if the large increase of churches and attendance upon religious worship, as well as the remarkable increase in the number and character of the schools here, have any significance, this city ever stood higher in morals and intelligence than it does to-day. Rev. Mr. Alvord, as Inspector of Schools, has made a report to General Slocum, and it will shortly be made public; and it is on this account that his remarkable observations, upon which we have earnestly contended, become of some significance. If that report is not written with more discretion and more correctness in matters of fact than his speech to the school-teachers, it will be a degrading and mischievous document.
