TO BE CONTESTED.—We understand that it is the intention of Mr. Geo. W. Clifford to contest the election of Mr. Samuel Beach as Magistrate in the 3d district, on the ground that several of the votes cast were illegal.

The unanimous election of Capt. STEUBERT to the important position of Sheriff of this county, is a deservedly high compliment. An election to an office of trust and profit now-a-days, without opposition, is an anomaly.

A fire occurred at the residence of Bishop Johns, near the Seminary, this morning, which was fortunately extinguished by the inmates of the house before much injury was done. The fire originated under the hearth in the kitchen, and burned several of the rafters, the damage being estimated at about \$100.

A few days since the officers of the customs at Rouse's Point, New York, seized some \$2,000 worth of alcohol in casks invoiced purchased in varnish, which proved to contain a slight mixture of gum stiel-lac in alcohol in order to pass it through the custom-houses as varnish.

ALEXANDRIA COUNTY.—The following is the result of the election held in this county, yesterday, for Sheriff and Constables, and 5th Magistrate districts: For Sheriff—There were five hundred and eighty-three votes cast, of which CAPT. For Constables.—S. N. Chipley, Jas. Padgett, S. N. Aubineo and Jas. Walsh were elected, the vote being for Chipley, 313; Padgett, 289; Aubineo, 264, and Walsh, 237. Messrs. Davis, Webster, Arnell, Beach and Edelin each received several scattering votes.

In the 5th district Jas. C. Roach was elected over George Reed, the former receiving 55 votes and the latter 30.
