Religious Freedom—Soul Liberty.
The following resolutions were adopted by the recent Southern Baptist Convention, by a vote of 135 to 9:

"Many of our Christian brethren, of different denominations, and in various portions of the United States, having been restrained and annoyed in their appropriate work of preaching the Gospel of Christ, sometimes by civil and sometimes by military authority, contrary to the fundamental principles of religious liberty and the paramount claims of Jesus Christ, we, members of the Southern Baptist Convention, deem it a proper occasion for re-asserting and proclaiming the principles of 'Soul Liberty,' which our fathers were the first to publish, for the maintenance of which they suffered persecution, in which they have for ages gloried, and which we should be the last to abandon. We solemnly resolve, in the face of the world and in the face of God,

1. That we believe civil government to be of divine appointment, and that magistrates should be obeyed in all things not contrary to the rights of conscience and the revealed will of Christ.

2. That Christ is the supreme ruler of the Church; that it is His prerogative to put men into the Gospel ministry, and that they are answerable to Him for the discharge of its functions; that all interference with these functions, in the part of civil rulers, transgresses their legitimate authority, and is a usurpation of the right of conscience; and that when the claims of civil rulers come in conflict with those of Christ, it is our duty to 'obey God rather than man, and endure the consequences.'

3. That we express our sincere sympathy and high regard for those ministers who in following the dictates of their consciences and maintaining the authority of their supreme law-giver, have cheerfully submitted to fines, imprisonments, and other 'pains and penalties'; and that we will earnestly pray that rulers may be so considerate and just, and that Christian ministers may be so discreet and upright, that the cause of Christ may not be hindered and the name of God blasphemed.

Resol'd, 4. That in adopting these resolutions the Convention expressly disavows any disposition to interfere with political affairs, and has regard solely to the question of religious liberty.

GOLD AND COTTON.—The demand for gold does not seem to be very great in New York, and there are indications that it will decline in price. The transactions in gold were very limited during the last day or two—less than a hundred thousand dollars having been bought and sold in the open market. The Treasury, as we have heretofore mentioned, has discontinued its sales since last Tuesday week. The amount which was thrown in the market during the fright of the European crisis has probably had a favorable effect upon the price of American cotton and securities abroad, and in that way has been worth vastly more to the country than would have been the paltry gain which might, as things turned out, have been secured by holding it back. A large portion of the gold that has been shipped to England during the panic was sent for the necessary purpose of paying the interest on the five-twenty bonds held abroad. This amount was eight or ten millions of dollars. The rest went to pay debts; and after all, it does not appear that a sum near equal to the whole amount which the Treasury has lately sold—say thirty millions—has gone out. Much of it still remains here.

THE CORN GRUB.—The corn grub has several formidable enemies to contend with, and among them is the grub, which sometimes literally destroys whole fields, or damages the crop seriously. One of the best and most concentrated remedies—perhaps the very best ever suggested—is the application of salt, as soon as the plant makes its appearance above ground, prepared and used in this way: Take one part common salt and three parts plaster of gypsum, and apply about a table-spoonful around each hill. It will be found to be a sure protection. The mixture should not come in contact with the young plants, as it may destroy them. This method has been tried extensively by some of the best farmers of Pennsylvania, Delaware and Jersey, and when properly applied, has never failed to be perfectly successful. We hope our farmers, who have reason to fear the depredations of the grub the present season, will try this mixture, leaving a few alternate rows without the salt, and communicate to us the result. —*Germania Telegraph.*
