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LOCAL NEWS.

THE ALEXANDRIA CANAL—SPEEDY RESUMPTION OF NAVIGATION.—We have been informed by Mr. Quigley, one of the lessees of the Alexandria Canal, that the repairs on the Long Bridge are in such progress, that on Monday, the 16th proximo, the work will be completed, and travel again resumed over that important structure.

As appropriate to the above we publish the following extract from the Cumberland Civilian:—The Coal trade of Allegheny county has never been so briskly carried on as during the present season, but unfortunately there is a great stumbling block in the way, and one which must be removed at the earliest possible moment.

RAINBOWS.—A most magnificent rainbow spanned the eastern heavens yesterday afternoon. The lofty and perfect arch, remained entire for some time, with the colors glowing in the rays of the declining sun.

FALSE RUMOR.—The rumor on the streets last night, and this morning, that the Senate had yesterday by a vote of 29 to 16, passed the bill annexing Alexandria to the District of Columbia, was without foundation.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.—The friends of negro suffrage in the District of Columbia, claim that the bill to effect that object will pass both houses of Congress—and even, if necessary, by a vote sufficient to over-ride a veto.

THE WEATHER has turned cooler since the late rains, and the temperature to-day was delightful.

POLICE REPORT.—MAYOR'S OFFICE.—Ella White, for assaulting Ella Summers, at a dance at the Green House, was arrested last night by the Night Watch, taken to the Watch House and released; but for a repetition of the assault immediately after her discharge, she was re-arrested and after the payment of the imposed fine, again discharged.

MAGISTRATES' OFFICE.—Edward Javins, for disorderly conduct at the Potomac garden, last night, was held in the sum of \$100 security for his good behavior for six months.

THE DEATHS by cholera have ceased at the New York quarantine. Only sixteen patients now remain under treatment on board the hospital ship.

No one but the grateful reporter knew why he did so. This was another reporter sent a hurried note to the Chief Clerk of the Exchequer, asking for some information as to his banquet speech. On the Thursday afternoon the foremost man in England walked into the reporter's den, and politely gave the astonished 'gentleman of the press' what he required. Similar anecdotes might be told of Lord Stanley, and they are merely mentioned as a hint to local 'great men' who think it a part of their role to snub the reporter, so frequently their superior in the sense in which a man is judged to be or not to be a gentleman."
