General News.

The George Appold was seized in Norfolk just before starting for Boston by an oyster inspector, for an alleged violation of the oyster laws of Virginia. The steamer was released on the agent, Mr. Patten, giving bonds to the amount of \$6,000. The attorney general of Virginia has given his opinion to the agents of the lines of steamers running from Norfolk that the oyster regulations are intended for coasting vessels, schooners, &c., trading in the waters of Virginia, and not common carriers of freight, such as the Boston, New York, Philadelphia, and other lines of steamers.

Lindsay, the clergyman at Medina who whipped his child to death because he would not say his prayers, and who was released on ten thousand dollars bail, immediately upon being set at liberty, went to the house of his brother-in-law to stay, but was not allowed to do so, the brother-in-law fearing that his house would be torn down by an excited mob, and the miserable man has again taken up his quarters in the jail at Albion, this time voluntarily, but really to escape summary punishment at the hands of an infuriated and indignant public.

Some of the professional burglars have adopted a new method of obtaining information in regard to desirable places for "operations." During business hours, when householders are absent, men call at their residences, and, representing themselves to be internal revenue officers, make minute inquiries of the servants about their masters' occupations, habits, silver-plate, furniture, &c., which information is taken advantage of by burglars.

The Manchester (England) Guardian records a terrible explosion of fire dam in the Victoria pit of the Dukinfield Colliery Company, about 8 o'clock on the morning of the 14th inst., by which thirty-seven persons lost their lives and thirty were wounded. The cause of the explosion is not positively known, as the person charged with the duty of examining the pit previous to the descent of the men is among the killed.

The Chicago Tribune, in noticing the disastrous results of a strike in that city, says: "If any other power than a 'workmen's' protective union, had discharged from employment the three hundred stone-cutters of Chicago, who since the 5th of June have lost \$1,200 per day, or about \$23,000 in all, the police of Chicago would be hardly able to protect the dischargers from the fury of the discharged."

The New York revenue agent, Mr. Lewis, has discovered that a large number of wealthy capitalists have invested money in the manufacture of illicit whiskey, owing to the vast profits arising from the business. They have employed parties to act as the nominal proprietors of their establishments in order to shield themselves from the consequences of a prosecution for defrauding the revenue.

Jared Ingersoll, of Philadelphia, has pleaded guilty of purloining books from the Mercantile Library of that city. He further admitted that he had robbed other libraries. The books taken were sold for waste paper. The librarian, who detected him putting the books under his coat, testified that during the last seven years over \$10,000 worth of books had been lost in his manner.

It is stated that no more swill milk is produced in New York. This is owing to the stringent regulations against herding animals. No more than one cow may be kept on each lot of ground, except by special permission. A similar rule is also to be carried out in Brooklyn.

A Boston merchant, representing one of the largest and most influential houses in the country, is out in the Boston Post against the proposed tariff, and suggests a public meeting to denigrate the new rates, and to repudiate the whole schedule as unjust, arbitrary and injurious.

Jas. W. Dunsan, late of the Confederate Army, recently tried by a military commission at Savannah, Ga., has been sentenced to be confined at hard labor for fifteen years, at Fort Pulaski, Ga., for "murder in violation of the laws of war."

The grand jury at Canandaigua, N. Y., has presented indictments against the Fenian prisoners arrested at Buffalo and Malone. The cases will be postponed to the next term, and the prisoners released on bail.

Mrs. Heggie, of Ithaca, N. Y., who was indicted two years since for the murder of her daughter, by poisoning, was convicted on Friday of murder in the first degree.
