

LOCAL NEWS.

THE AQUEDUCT.—Notwithstanding the assurances made, and the assurances given, by the authorities in Washington, that the Aqueduct, over the Potomac, should be given up to the Lessees of the Alexandria Canal, just as soon as the absolute necessity for its retention by the Government ceased, and the Long Bridge had been put in a condition to accommodate travel, yet upon an application to the Secretary of War, for the surrender of the work, yesterday, the Lessees were met with a flat refusal, and it was intimated that there was no intention, at present, of giving up the Aqueduct to the Company. This extraordinary proceeding, naturally enough, caused much surprise and indignation on the part of our people, but the Lessees, determined not to be outdone, gave us understand, resolved to press the matter, and will, it is understood, carry it directly to the President, in the hopes of obtaining a reversal of the decision of the Secretary, to which effort it is believed they will prosecute.

REMOVALS.—"Several citizens" request the attention of the Superintendent of Police "to an addition of numerous back yards to the buildings in different quarters of the city, which are occupied by colored persons not generally known, or long residents here," and urge the necessity of having them "cleaned and kept clean," and the use of large quantities of "boards of lime," and further "that the occupants or owners of such premises should have the law concerning nuisances enforced in these cases," and, further, that "the night carts, with a supply of lime, should be employed to go round to these places, and the expenses charged to the owners of the property where the nuisances exist."

THE HOMICIDE AT PISCATAWAY MD.—In relation to the recent homicide at Piscataway, the Marlboro Gazette says:—"Harris, aged about 16 years, attending in his father's store, was attacked by Clements, and after retreating about the counter, and finding himself pursued by Clements with a knife, seized a pistol and shot him. The deceased was partially intoxicated, and approaching the boy with threats and an open knife in hand, the lad very naturally became greatly alarmed for his safety, and finding no chance of escape, except by jumping out of a window, he on the impulse of the moment, resorted to the only means in his power of self defence. He was held to bail for his appearance at Court. A Jury of Inquest found the facts as above stated."

DOGS.—We are requested to call attention to the large increase of dogs, in this place, as compared with the number given in to the police officers when they made their late census. Especially, it is said, is this increase visible and noticeable in the neighborhoods adjoining the streets created and occupied by the "country-boys," who have come in here during and since the war. In some of these shanties three or four dogs are kept, and at night their noise and barking are very annoying for squares. Some think taxes are not paid on much more than half the dogs kept in town.

THE RAINS continue, followed by warm weather—the very season for the growth of almost every thing that the earth produces. Last night there was a heavy shower; and to-day hot sun. Most abundant, in all probability, will be the yield of corn—and never were the crops of vegetables more overflowing. Fruits of almost all kinds—peaches excepted—will also be unusually abundant—such as apples, pears, melons, cantaloupes, &c., &c.; and there is a great blessing they will be cheap, too.

PRINCE GEORGE'S, MD.—Judge Berry has convened an extra session of the Circuit Court of this county, in view of the large number of criminals awaiting trial, and the precarious condition of the prison. The term will commence on the 3rd day of September next. The prisoners, 37 in number, have been removed to the Grand Jury room, where they are secured and guarded. Amongst them are the murderers Mr. Lyles.

COAL.—"A Subscriber" writes us that the price of coal is higher in the Alexandria market than in Washington and Baltimore. Green corn has been selling here, for the last few days, at from 15c to 20c per bushel. Corn is cheaper, at a week ago. Corn is very abundant—the fields loaded with the finest wheat, and it ought, we should think, to be lower than it is.

TRAVEL.—There is, just now, a great deal of business on the steamboat routes between this place and Baltimore. The creation of wharves at several of the landings on the Potomac river, has been of advantage to the boats, and contributed to this increase of travel.

GRASS.—The fields and meadows are clothed with as heavy a growth of grass, as was ever seen in the month of August. The cattle, therefore, have fine pastures, and fare well. Butter ought to be made in large quantities.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—Mr. Ellsworth Spear, a young man, residing about two miles north of Fairfax Court-House, had his arm horribly crushed in a wheat threshing machine yesterday, while engaged about the machine.

ARREST.—Officer Webster last week arrested two negro men, in Alexandria county, who were charged with committing a robbery in Washington, a few nights before. They have been committed to jail in Washington.

EDUCATIONAL.

WASHINGTON FREE SCHOOL.—A special meeting of the Board of Guardians of this institution was held yesterday evening, at which much important business, relative to the school, was transacted. The resignation of Rev. C. C. Biting, as a member of the Board, was received and accepted, and John S. Beach was elected to fill the vacancy. The Board was then fully organized by the election of Richard L. Carne, jr., as President; Edgar Snowden, jr., as Secretary; and Capt. N. Boush as Treasurer; and suitable regulations for the government of the school were adopted.

The Board then proceeded to the election of a teacher, in the place of H. Clay Speake, who declined a re-election. There were eleven applicants; one each from Washington, Richmond, and six from this city, and on the fifth ballot Colonel S. King Shay was unanimously elected. On motion, Miss Aurelia V. K. Shay was then chosen Assistant Teacher; the salary of the Principal being fixed at \$500, and that of the Assistant at \$300 per annum. Should the number of pupils exceed a hundred, another teacher will be elected.

The very large number of boys attending last session, (160 to a single teacher,) many of them sons of persons who were able to pay for their education, determined the Board, (as the finances of the Corporation will not permit the engagement of additional teachers at the public expense,) to make a small charge for each pupil, orphans and sons of widows and other equally destitute persons only, excepted. The school, in its original foundation by Gen. Washington, was designed for orphans only; and the law of the Corporation which governs it, looks to the education of the children of the poor alone; those, therefore, who have been sending some free, whilst they were able to pay, have been obstacles to the full carrying out of the plan on which the school was founded.

Now, however, provision has been made to meet the case of those who are able to pay a small sum, and it is arranged that all persons residing in the First Ward who wish to enter their sons shall apply to E. Snowden, jr.; those in the Second to John S. Beach; those in the Third to Richard L. Carne, jr.; and those in the Fourth to the Rev. J. T. Lettwich, by whom permits will be granted, on the payment of the tuition fee.

PERSONAL.—Gen. Joseph E. Johnston, accompanied by his wife, reached this city last night, and stayed at the Mansion House. They left this morning on the Orange train for one of the Virginia Springs. The General was serenaded last night and a number of rockets sent up in honor of his presence, but he declined to make a speech, on account of feeble health.

THE EXCURSIONISTS.—The party of gentlemen who left this city a week or two ago, on a pleasure trip down the Potomac and Chesapeake Bay, were, last night, at Kinsale, en route for home, having had a delightful trip. All well and in fine spirits.

The arrivals at the Mansion House yesterday were very numerous, and among the guests were Gen. J. E. Johnston, Rev. S. S. Roszel, Col. J. W. Fairfax, Rev. Dr. Bond, Rev. F. M. Edwards and Rev. Dr. J. Murray.

A negro man, arrested at Fall's Church, for stealing, and brought to Fairfax Court-House, by special constable Clover, broke away at the jail door, and though hotly pursued, succeeded in making his escape.

MINISTER CALLED.—The Rev. Alfred Randolph, of Halifax, has been called to the Restorship of Christ Church, in this place by the Vestry—but it is not known whether the call will be accepted.

MARRIAGE LICENSES.—Since July there were sixteen marriage licenses issued from the Clerk's Office of the County Court of this county.

DEEDS.—During the last term of the County Court of this county, there have been sixteen deeds admitted to record in the Clerk's Office.

WASHINGTON ITEMS.—General Sherman was complimented last night with a serenade. He made a brief response to the call of the crowd, remarking that he had nothing to say, excepting that his home was at St. Louis, where he would be glad to see those before him, or on the Plains, where he intended to go. He was a stranger here, and thought the less a man said in Washington the better, and as he was his own best friend he would add no more than to express his thanks for the honor conferred upon him on this occasion.

A large meeting was held at Grover's Theatre last night by the friends of Ireland, to defend the restoration policy of the President, and to vindicate the recent enforcement of the neutrality laws. This meeting was an offset to the one lately held at the Fair building, which was anti-Administration in its character. In accordance with instructions from the headquarters of the army, Major General Augur, commanding the department of Washington, has ordered the Soldiers' Rest at the depot of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, to be discontinued.

The Executive Mansion was literally swarmed yesterday by anxious seekers of an audience with the President. About one-half of the visitors were women. At eleven o'clock the President ordered the audience room to be thrown open to all comers, and he received them one by one, in their order, and in the presence of each other.

The resolution on continuance of the Fair building was not signed. The resolution placing its use under the control of the presiding officers of the two houses, was approved by the President.
