The Rights of Trial.

On the Common Council, on Tuesday night, Dr. J. B. Johnson offered a preamble and resolution in reference to Mr. Davis, prefacing their introduction with the following remarks, which we publish at his request:

Mr. PRESIDENT: I propose this evening to offer a preamble and resolution, which may make you somewhat by surprise, as being the first of the character offered in a like body, either North or south of Mason and Dixon's line. When a truly desirable object is to be attained, the sooner the effort is made to obtain that object, the better; and I have thought it well that we should show some feeble indication of the general anxiety which is manifested on the subject to which I intend to refer. The sciolist will probably read them with a smile, and the time server and timid citizen, will regard both the time and the place of their introduction as improper; but the true son, not only of once undivided and once undaunted Virginia, but of the United States, will, as by instinct, recognize the point which they indicate as very truly vital to himself, but common to every free white American citizen. There are subjects of interest to the citizen, which come not only to the time and the place for their introduction, but to the manner of their introduction, which the resolution refers is not of that restricted character. Its value is as inestimable as it is ceaseless, and all times and all places are its times and its places. It is the Heavenly right of walking, unimpeded by illegal force, upon God's eternal footstool, and of breathing, unconfined by arbitrary power, God's free pure air; for there are principles as well established in the legal and moral world, as there are truths confirmed in the physical, and no part of law is better sustained than that which proclaims that a man is not to be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. The Constitution of the United States was intended to be the helm of America's career, and designed that the conduct of the men who were to be elected under its provisions to administer its plain instructions, was to be guided by its letter and spirit, and not its letter and spirit by the opinions and bias of those whom a popular favor might place in temporary guardianship of all its unmitigated franchises; and if there are clauses or sections, or parts of sections, in that abused, torn and comforted compact between co-equal and sovereign States, about which there may be a reasonable difference of opinion, it embodies, at least, one clause which is incapable of any other interpretation than that which is so plainly mentioned in it, letter by letter, word by word, and sentence by sentence. It is so full, perfect and precise in all its parts, that its language needs to be read to be understood. It is as follows:

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and each trial shall be held in the State where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

Plain as this clause of the Second Section of the Third Article of the Constitution is, the wise men of 1787, who had fought so long and so hard, and achieved victory so dearly, felt all the measure of its blessing; and, fearing that they had not sufficiently secured it against the encroachment which might arise on the part of those representatives to whom they had entrusted the care of their "delegated powers," added the following language to be creted into an organic law, and it became the Sixth Article of the "Amendments to the Constitution":

"In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense."

Such are the explicit mandates of the original clause of the Second Section of the Third Article of the Constitution of the United States, and of one of the Articles of the "Amendments of the Constitution." On a strict observance of them depends all the assurance and contentment of personal safety; and when an American citizen hears that his neighbor has been arrested and imprisoned "without due process of law," the anxious promptitude of a terrible alarm should fill his mind, and the most solicitous attention should be used to bring into operation the powers that nature and education have given him, to ensure that neither all rights to which he is entitled; for liberty is so great a blessing, that it is so dear to us, that we give direct or indirect countenance to the spies, agencies or influences which may presume to override organic law, and will not, at all times, and in all places, attempt to rebuke the temerity of the public representative, who would, under whatever pretext, lay paragon hands upon such a precious barrier, is fit to be a slave of the most mercenary impulses, and encourages a lawlessness, which, at any moment, may be turned upon himself with all the rigor of arbitrary force.

which the Constitution, founded and proclaimed by our forefathers, gives to one in his lonely and ruthless situation; and, remote as it may be, to offer the preamble and resolution in defense of an inalienable right, that is as common as it is dear, to every free white American citizen.
