**GENERAL NEWS.**  
Mr. Samuel Jessup, aged sixty-five, and rich,  
died lately in Lincolnshire, England. He was  
a bachelor, had no relatives, and enjoyed general  
good health, notwithstanding that during  
the last twenty years of his life he was  
noted for an inordinate craving for medicines.  
From 1794 to 1816 it was proven, in a trial  
before a court, that he took 229,834 pills, being  
an average 29 per diem. But he began with  
a moderate appetite, which increased to that  
extent that from 1812 to 1816, inclusive, he  
took 78 pills a day, and in 1840 he took 50,500  
during the year. It was shown that, besides,  
he had taken 40,000 bottles of different mixtures.  
All this was supplied to him by one  
apothecary, whose bill, when presented in  
court, took up fifty-five closely written columns.  
A patent has just been issued to J. H. Connelly,  
of Wheeling, for manufacturing gas, by  
introducing petroleum or its products (residual  
into the retorts with lime water, when  
charged with coal; producing more gas with  
two retorts than can be produced in the same  
time with three when coal alone is used in the  
ordinary way; and the gas thus produced has  
twenty per cent. more illuminating power, as  
demonstrated by the photometer test; and can  
be readily applied to any gas works now in  
operation.

A party recently ascended Mt. Hood, Oregon,  
to its very summit. They ascertained its  
height to be 17,609 feet, and also, to a certainty,  
that it is a volcano. If this measurement be  
correct, Mt. Hood is the highest peak in the  
United States.
