**THE VIRGINIA FARMERS' CONVENTION.**  
THIRD DAY.

The Chair announced the following gentlemen as the committee to memorialize the Legislature on the subject of the repeal of the usury law: Messrs. John D. Imboden, ex-Governor Smith, and Wm. Frazier.

Mr. Richard Irbly, of Notoway, moved a resolution appointing a committee of five, representing different sections of the State, whose duty it shall be to test such labor-saving machines as the executive committee may designate. The resolution was adopted—Committee: Messrs. William M. Tate, R. W. N. Nowland, W. C. Knight, General W. H. F. Lee, and R. H. Carter.

The Chair announced the following gentlemen as constituting the committee to memorialize the Legislature on the subject of immigration: Messrs. J. Ravenscroft Jones, Wm. D. Hart, General William H. Richardson, James Lybden, and Lewis E. Harvie.

Gen. Imboden offered a preamble and resolution setting forth the importance of education in agriculture as a science, approving the establishment of professorships of agriculture and mineralogy in schools, and urging parents in the State to give to those who are to be farmers as liberal an education in their speciality as they give to those destined for other callings in life.

Rev. Mr. Davis, professor of Agriculture and Agricultural Chemistry in Roanoke College, addressed the Convention for some time upon the importance of agricultural education and the vital and fundamental character of the occupation of the agriculturist.

At the conclusion of the remarks of Mr. Davis, the preamble and resolution were adopted.

Mr. Davis offered a resolution urging the establishment of agricultural clubs in every part of the State, which was adopted.

Mr. Nowland, from the committee appointed to examine Arnall's wheat-cleaner, reported that, having examined the machine in operation, they find that it is an invention of "great value to agriculture, being almost perfect as a separator of chaff and other extraneous substances from wheat."

Gov. Smith bore testimony to the admirable operation of this machine, stating that it had been of infinite value to the people of his district where the wheat was very full of chaff, chaff, &c.

On motion of Mr. Chambliss, a resolution was adopted for appointing a committee to ascertain if it is not possible to procure fertilizers of the next crops, and reports a soon as practicable. The resolution also invites the citizens of the counties to hold meetings on the subject. Committee: Messrs. Wood Bondin, Ed. Rubin, Richard Irbly, George W. Bondin, and John Enders.

The Convention went into a free conversational debate on the subject of the management of labor and the cultivation of farms with freedom.

Mr. Sutherland, of Danville, stated very much in detail the rules and usages upon his two farms near Danville and his farm in the southwestern part of Georgia. It was mainly the understanding prior to employment, by which they were to receive half of their pay each week, the balance being reserved for them. They were regularly paid—worked well—had only lost one man on the two plantations—had been very successful. Had made ten per cent. on his Georgia farm, and would make yet another ten per cent. He declared the present the finest opportunity to make money. Never was labor on the farm more richly paid than now. He drew a flattering picture of future prosperity in the cotton districts of the South.

Mr. Sutherland continued his remarks at much length, giving his views as to the practical and useful labor and good conduct of the freedmen when properly treated and managed. He expressed the most perfect confidence in the triumphant success of southern agriculture, and the complete restoration of the prosperity of Virginia by the well-directed industry of her people. Never was the field so bright with promise—never was the reward of labor so great. He offered much practical advice and a great deal of cheering and encouraging argument to sustain his own views and animate others.

After Mr. Sutherland's remarks, little else was transferred before the adjournment. A vote of thanks was passed for his practical and cheering speech; and he won approbation from many persons, especially the president of the society, who, in his valedictory, declared the speech of Mr. Sutherland one of the most gratifying he had heard for many years.

Mr. Sutherland's name was added to the Committee on Land.

There being no business before the Convention, the thanks of the body were tendered to the president for the able manner in which he had presided over their deliberations.

The motion to adjourn having been made, the president addressed a feeling and felicitous valedictory to the Convention, and declared the body adjourned sine die.
