At Valley Falls, near Providence, R. I. Rufus W. Cowden, a young man who had parted from his wife, called at her residence; and after an effort to induce her to enter a carriage, attempted to cut her throat with a razor. She struggled successfully for her life, although terribly wounded, until her grandfather came and drove off the wretch with a club. The husband eluded arrest until next day, when he appeared near his father's residence and cut his throat so thoroughly that he will probably die. He was partially intoxicated.

A quarrel has long existed between a man named Elgin, keeper of an inn at Missouri City, and the Titus brothers, five in number, residing near Platte City. The Titus brothers were in Missouri City on Sunday last, when a violent altercation took place between them and Elgin, in which the latter shot and killed two of the brothers, and succeeded in making his escape. During the following night he was traced to his hiding place, and the house was surrounded. He was killed by a ball in the back, while fleeing.

A suit of great importance to the State of West Virginia and to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, and also to the counties of the State through which that road passes, was argued and submitted in the court of Marshall county last week. The question is the liability of that company, under its charter and the laws of West Virginia, to taxation by the State and the counties through which the road passes. The company has hitherto claimed, and still claims, exemption from all taxation whatsoever.

Quartermaster General Meigs has prepared a collection of hoofs, leg bones and teeth of horses, showing the effects of the diseases to which these animals are subject from various causes. Several specimens of hoofs show clearly the poisonous effects of defective shoeing, and other specimens show the means usually adopted to remedy lameness so caused.
