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### LETTER FROM FAIRFAX

[Correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette.]  
FAIRFAX C. H., Dec. 7.—As sundry events have transpired here lately, showing a "waking up" in Fairfax, I proceed to record them in your columns. At December Court last two lots in the centre of this "burgh," which have been eye-sores for some time, were sold. They are the lots on which stood the old Allison tavern and stables, which were kindly "wiped out," with the assistance of the element of fire, during the late war, by our friends "in blue." Since then they have stood tenanted and forlorn, a waste and a ruin in the very metropolitan district of our village. They were purchased by O. W. Hunt, esq., and James Farguson, F. B.—the latter a gentleman of color, who waited on one Joseph E. Johnston, from Manassas first to Atlanta, and has now settled in this Southern community, fearless of being "crushed." The lots will both be improved. The "Union Hotel"—the largest in the place—has been sold to Col. Henry B. Tyler, formerly of the Marine Corps, and will be thoroughly repaired. The Colonel will keep the hotel himself, and with his well-known system and good management, as displayed years ago in improvements at the Marine Barracks in Washington, while commanding there, will doubtless make it a most inviting place of resort for country seekers in the summer, and pleasant for the wayfarer at all times. Mr. B. McNeil has sold out his large grocery and provision store to Messrs. John T. Triplett and John H. Thomas, two of our young men, who will open on a large scale, and with the "good will" of the whole community, will doubtless do well. Dr. James Weeks died here a few days ago. This worthy old gentleman will be long remembered for the resignation with which he bore distressing affliction. He had been both blind and bed-ridden for fifteen years. He was a native of Loudoun county, and had passed beyond the "three score and ten years" allotted to man. PEQOD.
