FLOODING IN MASSACHUSETTS.—The agent of the Tribune's Boston "bureau," communicates to that journal the following frightful statistics in relation to flooding in Massachusetts:

"Mr. George B. Emerson has been calling attention to some of the defective methods of education in the Boston schools, and Dr. Ordway, who is said to have a 'hobby,' and, therefore, like all men who have hobbies, a sort of red speckle to fogies and routineists, has made public some statistics in relation to flogging, or, to speak more mililo, corporal punishment, in these same institutions. The Doctor states, on the authority of the records kept by the teachers, that there have been thirteen thousand cases of this sort of discipline in nine months."

MISERY IN NORTH CAROLINA.—The following letter, from Raleigh, is confirmed by other sources of information:

"Those who were once rich are reduced to the last extremity of endurance. Large numbers are dependent for the necessities of life upon the Young Men's Christian Association, and the funds of that organization giving out a few days ago, those dependent upon it were without food for two days. Others have burned their furniture to keep warm, and night before last a woman and her infant were frozen to death. People here have now no thought of anything but how to live."
