**CHIGNON WEARERS.—ATTEND!**—A scientific writer in the London Lancet is trying to frighten the ladies from wearing chignon, by explaining to them how, under the microscope, each hair is found to be infested with countless myriads of parasites,—live little fellows, that are as indestructible as innumerable. We reproduce for the benefit of our fair friends, some of his revelations; though we suppose they will be affected only as was the chess-player by a similar officious service: "Let me show you, Mr. Green, what you are eating. Look through this microscope. Your cheese is full of animalcules. See how they wriggle!" After a long look, Green replied, as he returned to his mastication, "Let 'em wriggle. If they can stand it, I can."

The following is from the Lancet: "In every chignon now composed of the natural hair of the wearer, there are myriad parasites, some gregarious, which infest each individual hair. These insects are invisible except by microscopic test, but in their substance and habits are more offensive than the famed greylock of the war. On every half inch are a thousand of these impressively disgusting epizoa. They 'hive, move, and have their being' in millions upon the hair of the chignon, and when the myriad hairs that compose these 'adornments' are considered, the numbers of the minute and abominable epizoa are 'as the sands on the sea-shore, or as the stars of Heaven for multitude.' Subjected to a moderate degree of heat, they become instinct with life, and wandering at will among and around the capillary cells 'seeking what they may devour.' Each is a *pediculus humani capitis*, as much so as the identical one on which Burns wrote the ode, when he saw it 'on the lady's bonnet.'—Neither acids, alkalis, either, nor 350 degrees of dry heat kills them. Practically they are indestructible. According to the authority quoted, in the conditions of a ball-room the gregarious 'revive, grow, and multiply by dividing into many parts—called germ globules; these fly about the ball-room in millions, get inhaled, drop on the refreshment, and in fact, enter the interior of people by hundreds of ways and thus reach their specific gregarious development."

**WONDERFUL WINDFALLS.**—England is the country for wonderful windfalls—of fortunes falling from the skies, in the most unexpected and fair-tale fashion. An ex-policeman of London, the other day, came into a property of \$750,000. He had been living on the police pension of fourteen shillings a week, which is given after twenty years' faithful service. The lawyer who got it for him made it a condition that he should give \$125,000 to poor relatives and another \$125,000 to certain hospitals for the benefit of the poor.

A miserly old Scotchman, one Ferguson, has just died, immensely rich—died very suddenly as he was signing a check for \$50,000. He was struck with paralysis when the name was half written. He left his property to charities and to hundreds of poor people, whom all his life he had utterly neglected. Day laborers, masons, carpenters, and in one case a poor fish hawker, suddenly became possessed of thousands in lottery in which they had not even bought a ticket. He had not been within the walls of a church for forty years, so he left a sum for the spread of the Gospel.

The case of Mr. D. D. Hume, the once famous medium, is most curious of all. He was perfectly penniless and in great trouble; he clung to the valuable presents he had received—keepsakes he would scarcely have parted with to keep him from starving, and his expectations of property from the estate of his Russian wife were only at the end of a tedious litigation. At this juncture a rich old lady, and an entire stranger, adopted him for her son and heir. She gave him \$120,000 in cash, just for his immediate need, and a few days ago handed him his Christmas box of \$30,000. "Why," said he, telling of this little token of maternal affection, "it's like a fairy tale, isn't it?" And the best of it is that the adopted son and adopted mother are entirely delighted with each other. It should be remembered that all the above sums must be calculated on a gold basis.

**TRINITY, (SO-CALLED EPISCOPAL) CHURCH, IN NEW YORK.**—The following is an extract from the letter of a lady (Episcopal) now in New York, giving an account of her visit to Trinity Church:

"The service had begun when I arrived at the Church. It is a long, narrow structure, with pillars four times as large as ours, supporting one of those remarkable roofs—large-stained glass windows, and jets of gas like stars—an altar cloth elaborately worked, and seven figures above it—then fifty candles in groups, and about twenty boys dressed in white tunics flowing from their shoulders, and they singing in the most remarkable way during the ceremonies—not one word of which I could understand, except 'Amen!' Then there were eight ministers, who sang the prayers. The singing was done entirely by two *primos*, *altos*, and in a subdued tone, as if at a distance, and you could not see them—the intense organ accompanying them from an opposite quarter of the church. The crowd came in and went out during these services until the sermon commenced, but I could not see, nor scarcely hear, the preacher. The communion was then held differing greatly from the way in Virginia, and the singing most remarkable."—*Charlottesville Chronicle*
