

LOCAL NEWS.

JOHN HAMILTON, "OF TEXAS"—An assemblage of about three hundred colored people, nearly all of whom were old residents of the city, and fourteen white people, who have resided here since the commencement of the war, convened last night at the First Colored Baptist Church, on Alfred street, and, at eight o'clock, was called to order by R. D. Beckley, colored, who nominated as chairman, "George Tucker, the rightful Mayor of Alexandria." The nomination being endorsed, Mr. Tucker, after a prayer, by a colored preacher, named Parker, introduced to the meeting Ex-Provisional Governor John Hamilton, of Texas, the first man in the South, within the chairman's knowledge, who had advocated manhood suffrage. Mr. Hamilton then arose, and for the space of two hours indulged himself in the delivery of a speech, for triteness, demagoguism and incendiaryism was never excelled in this city, save by some of the Rev. Mr. Hunt's sermons. He justified the desecration of pulpits to partisan purposes. He compared Virginia now to what she was in times gone by—and the evidence was decidedly in favor of her former condition. He said that the statesmanship of to-day was infinitely superior to that which obtained in former days, and that any man of sound mind, who had gone through the experience of the last five years, was a better statesman than Daniel Webster! He found heinous faults with the constitutions of the States of New York and Ohio, and asserted that if Congress, whose course he did not particularly admire, had the nerve, affairs in those States would be speedily corrected. General R. E. Lee, General Wade Hampton, Gov. Wm. Smith and all the gentlemen of extended influence throughout the South, whose efforts since the termination of the war have been exerted to restore peace and quietness, he severely censured, while the character of the "Southern Loyalists" met his approval. He was opposed to graduation in society, and said that with the exceptions of some of the double V's none in the South could trace their genealogy back for five generations without being in danger of discovering that their ancestors were as much slaves as the deceased Lincoln, which he, Hamilton, had advised that President not to revoke. He said that quelling a rebellion without punishing some one after it was quelled, was not to be thought of, but that one thousand of the leading rebels had been so marked and expatriated that ten thousand others would have been scared into leaving the country with them.

This, it must be confessed, was a novel application of the idea that if a rat is caught and seized by fire, and turned loose, all the other rats infesting his locality will be scared away. He advised his hearers to bind themselves together, and stick to their friends from the North; and closed by stating that a community always finds out its best men, and honors them accordingly; which, assertion some of his auditors thought had been exemplified in the treatment the speaker receives from his own community.

After a vote of thanks had been tendered the speaker by Mr. John Hawkhurst, and accepted and a collection taken up to pay for gas, the assemblage dispersed.

COUNTY COURT—WEDNESDAY.—Richard A. Ridd vs. George W. Dearborn—on appeal—judgment of justice below reversed, and judgment against the defendant for \$39 50, with interest from January 23d, 1861, till paid, and for costs.

C. F. Suttle & Co. vs. J. P. Bartholomew—assumpsit, attachment. The Court ordered that the defendant pay to the plaintiffs the sum of \$68 50, with interest from September 15th, 1860, till paid, and for costs.

An account of Joseph Padgett, Jailor, against the Commonwealth, amounting to one hundred and seventy-seven dollars, was examined and allowed.

Bartholomew Ahern vs. James Tatterson—in case. It was considered by the Court that the plaintiff recover against the defendant seventy dollars and eighty cents, with interest from September 22d, 1860, and costs.

Williams & Ames vs. Samuel R. Adams—case enquiry. Jury assessed the plaintiffs damages at \$325 47, with interest from July 1st, 1861, judgment accordingly, and for costs.

John West vs. Felix Greenapple—case. It was considered by the Court that the defendant recover against the plaintiff his costs.

Bartholomew Ahern vs. Henry Blish—renewal—judgment against the defendant for twenty-six dollars and fifty-five cents, with interest from October 18th, 1860, and for costs. The Court adjourned till 11 o'clock to-day.

THE NEW STEAMSHIP LINE.—The New York, Alexandria, Washington and Georgetown Steamship Line, is now in successful operation, and is becoming, it is stated, more and more popular. The steamers E. C. Knight and John Gibson, make regular trips between New York and the ports of this city and the District of Columbia, always with full freight lists and complements of passengers.

NOT THE RIGHT MAN.—The Marlboro' Gazette says: "The negro man lately committed to our county jail, supposed to be Richard, one of the murderers of Mr. Lyles, has not yet been identified, and, from circumstances connected with his case, it is believed that the right man has not yet been found."

SOUTHERN PROTECTION INSURANCE COMPANY.—A meeting of the directors of the Southern Protection Fire Insurance Company was held at the Mansion House yesterday evening, but, no quorum being present, it adjourned to meet again on the 24th instant.

Fifteen hundred dollars of Alexandria Corporation Stock, one thousand of which was in a coupon bond, were sold to J. C. McGuire, for 43.

Twenty-eight shares of Alexandria Water Company's Stock, were sold to J. B. Daingerfield, for 45 per share.

Three one thousand dollar Manassas Gap Railroad Bonds, with interest due for six years, were sold to J. C. McGuire, for 33.

RECEIPTS OF CORN.—We are pleased to learn that corn is not arriving freely at this time by both the railroads and river, but were gratified this morning to understand from a gentleman who came from Fauquier to this city on horseback, that he passed, on the road to Alexandria, a number of wagons heavily loaded with this, at present, necessary and valuable cereal; we are also pleased to state that the demand is equal to the supply, there being several large buyers in the market, notwithstanding the high price in corn.

LARGE HERRING.—A herring 18 1/2 inches long, 1 1/2 inches round the body, and 2 1/2 thick through the back, and weighing 3 1/2 pounds, was caught yesterday at Fowke's landing, and was sent to this city this morning with a lot of other fish. This is the largest herring, it is said, by old fishermen, ever caught on the Potomac.

COMMITTEE MEETING.—The gentlemen selected to canvass the different wards of the city for contributions to the fund for the relief of the poor in the South, are requested to meet at ten o'clock to-morrow morning, at the banking house of Burke, Herbert & Co., on King street.

LACK OF CAUTION.—Notwithstanding the almost daily notices of robberies committed in this city, the watchmen, on their rounds, frequently discover the doors and windows of stores and dwellings left open at night. The window of a grocery store on King street was found unsecured last night.

PRESENTS.—Some of our kind friends engaged in the fish trade, this season, have recently sent us presents of the finest rock and perch, we ever saw, with specimens of the run of shad and herring.

MEAT HOUSE ROBBED.—The meat house of Mr. Townsend Fendall, near the tunnel, was robbed last night of some three or four hundred pounds of bacon, the property of Mr. J. W. Burke.

POLICE REPORT—MAYOR'S OFFICE.—John Williams, colored, arrested on suspicion of having in his possession articles of clothing that had been stolen, was committed to jail for further examination.
