

LOCAL NEWS.

MONDAY EVENING, APRIL 8.

LOUDBON AND HAMPSHIRE RAILROAD.—This important line of communication between Alexandria and the interior of the State, now in process of repair, is rapidly approaching Leesburg, to which its construction had reached at the commencement of the war, and where an extensive trade depot had been established.

FIRE.—The alarm of fire about ten o'clock on Saturday night last, was caused by the burning of the large frame building on Columbus street, near the corner of King, known as the Electric Academy, which remained unoccupied for a long time, but was recently rented by the congregation of a colored Baptist Church in this city, for the purpose of holding their meetings there until the repairs, now in progress to their own church, on Princess street, shall be completed.

FISHTOWN.—Fishtown has brightened up lately, and appearances there are beginning to assume their wonted appearance. The favorable weather that has prevailed for the last day or two, readily accounts for this change, by the increased catch of fish it has produced, and by the present weather continues for any length of time, as every prospect now indicates, this will prove a successful fishery.

MEETING OF THE GRAND LODGE OF I. O. O. F. OF VA.—P. G. M. Hugh Latham, representative from the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows of Virginia to the Grand Lodge of the United States, left here yesterday morning, to make his report to the Grand Lodge of Virginia, which convenes in Richmond on Wednesday, the 10th inst.

THE FINE WEATHER is not only pleasant in itself, but it is "profitable and useful" just at this time, in an eminent degree, enabling the farmers and gardeners, to go to work vigorously. The Potomac Fisheries are also feeling the beneficial effects. The arrivals, yesterday evening and this morning, with fine cargoes of fish of all varieties, were quite numerous, and the Fish Wharf presented a busy appearance.

RECOVERY OF MEAT.—A large portion of the meat stolen from Mr. John W. Burke, has, it is supposed, been recovered. It was found in a shop kept by a colored man named Green, on the corner of Royal and Wilkes streets, who asserts that he bought it from other parties. Several arrests of colored men have been made, but no definite result as to the guilt arrived at.

ABSENCE OF THE MAYOR.—In the absence of Mayor Latham, who is in Richmond, where he will remain during the current week, attending the meeting of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows of the State of Virginia, the duties of his office will be performed by Geo. Bryan, Esq., the President of the Board of Aldermen, and by Justice John Moore.

DISORDERLY.—A disturbance occurred at the Third Ward Restaurant, on Saturday night last, after the fire at the Electric Academy, in which the use of pistols and knives was threatened, if not executed. The proprietor was arrested and carried to the Watch-House, but afterwards released.

THE STEAMBOATS from Baltimore and the lower Potomac, came up yesterday, at an early hour, with freight and passengers. Several of the fishermen at the lower landings send up to the Washington and Alexandria markets their fish by this mode of conveyance.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY.—An effort was made last night to rob the residence of Mr. W. H. Muir, on the corner of Columbus and Queen streets, but the parties making the attempt being discovered by Mr. Muir and shot at, hastily made off.

SUIT.—The Warrenton Index says: "The suit of Walden vs. Beverly, which was expected to be tried at the present session of the Circuit Court, has been continued, on the application of the plaintiff."

OLD CAPITOL.—The Old Capitol building in Washington city, it is said was sold to the New York Hotel Company on Friday last for thirty thousand dollars. A large hotel is to be erected on the site.

POSTPONEMENT.—Bishop McGill having been detained at New Orleans, the Confirmation which had been expected to take place at St. Mary's Church yesterday, was necessarily postponed.

FLOUR INSPECTOR.—The office of Flour Inspector for this city, which has been vacant for some time past, has been filled by the re-appointment of its duties by Mr. E. B. Nalls.

REV. MR. MUNSEY, of this place, is expected to preach the sermon on the occasion of the dedication of the Methodist Church on Culpeper street, in Warrenton, Va.

THE ALEXANDRIA CANAL.—The repairs to the Alexandria Canal, necessitated by the slide which occurred in the berm bank, near the viaduct over the Washington Turnpike, last Thursday, have been completed, and water will be let in upon it to-night. A large fleet of boats, from Cumberland, with coal, for this city, are detained at Georgetown, awaiting resumption of navigation.

NUISANCE.—The nightly collection of young men and boys on the corner of Columbus and Oronoco streets has become so much a nuisance that ladies are prevented from passing there after dark. The police have been informed of the names of the parties who form these assemblages, and means to disperse them will be speedily resorted to.

GOVERNMENT STABLE DISCONTINUED.—The Government Stable, on the corner of Pitt and Queen streets, has been discontinued—its hands discharged, and the stock kept there turned over to the Superintendent of the Government wood yard.

PERSONAL.—Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, and ex-Senator McDougal, of California, are at present in this city.

BAPTISM.—Several colored persons were baptised, yesterday, at the usual place, near Battery Rodgers.

MAGISTRATES' OFFICE.—Festus Dickerson, for forging the name of Fitzhugh Lee, was committed to jail, for further examination. Several warrants were issued authorizing the police to search for articles stolen from Mr. John W. Burke and Mr. Edward Quinn.

WASHINGTON ITEMS.—Delegates from the various temperance orders had a meeting on Saturday evening and have decided to call a temperance convention the first week of May, and a temperance mass meeting in the second week of the same month.

The City Fire Department contemplate having a parade and inspection to day. It is rumored that about seventy mechanics and laborers will be discharged from the Washington arsenal about the 20th inst., owing to the lack of employment.

Walter Forrester, an old man sixty-seven years of age, a gardener by occupation, met a sudden death on Saturday, under the following circumstances: He was in the shoe-shop of Mr. O'Brien, in Uniontown, across the navy-yard bridge, and a child was playing about the floor with an old revolver, which was not supposed to be loaded, and which it had been using as a plaything for months. While thus engaged a man named Webster came in, and for the amusement of the child, took up the pistol, and putting a cap upon it, struck it, and exploded the charge taking effect and killing Forrester.
