LOCAL NEWS.

COUNTY COURT.—The May Term of the County Court for this county will be held by Justices Lewis McKenzie, John Moore, H. W. Febrey, P. R. Evans, and W. W. CROP PROSPECTS.—A note from a friend residing near Fall's Church, in Fairfax county, says that the farmers in that section are all busily engaged ploughing for corn, and that the wheat looks well and promises a full crop. The present rain will be of much benefit to the growing crops and to vegetables. In some sections of the surrounding country rain was wanted—the ground having become parched and hard.

FISH TOWN.—Fish Town were a more lively appearance this morning than it has done for several days past, in consequence of the arrival from the different fishing shores of an increased number of vessels. The supply of fish, however, is still far short of the demand, and precursive losses are anticipated by some who commenced the season under the most flattering prospects.

UNION STATE CONVENTION.—Richmond, April 28.—A call for a State Convention of Union men, at Charlottesville, May 29th, is being circulated among the Legislature for signatures. It is stated that if any such call as is mentioned above, has been made, it was neither signed by, nor presented to the Delegates from this county, nor were they aware of it until after its publication in the newspapers.

THE FORTUNATE MAN.—We have been informed, on good authority, that the gentleman of Fauquier county, who is expected to inherit the \$5,000,000 from a deceased relative in Ireland, a notice of which appeared in Monday's Gazette, taken from a Warrenton paper, is Col. John W. Patterson, who will shortly sail for Ireland to establish his claim.

NOT ENDED.—In reference to the case before the Supreme Court of the United States, of Purcell vs. Coleman and others, Judge Purcell states that he has filed a new and original bill against Virginia A. Miner, one of the parties holding the legal estate, who was never before brought into court, although a decree is in her favor.
