LOCAL NEWS.

MONDAY EVENING, JUNE 3.

THE CIRCUIT COURT.—The Circuit Court, Judge H. W. Thomas, after a laborious session of two weeks, closed its May term on Saturday evening last. A very large number of cases, some of them of long standing, were disposed of, and the docket nearly cleared. During the term several important opinions and decisions were delivered. Judge Thomas, by his impartial and courteous manner, his ability and sound judgment, has won not only the esteem of the Bar and all in attendance on the Court, but the high regard of his fellow-citizens throughout the District.

RAILROAD RECEIPTS.—The past week has been one of remarkable activity at the freight depot of the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, taxing the energies of the agent and his assistants to their utmost capacity. To dispatch the trains a considerable portion of the nights had to be consumed. The freight coming forward is quite brisk. The following are some of the leading articles: Corn, 21,150 bushels; wheat, 408 bushels; rye, 200 bushels; oats, 222 bushels; flaxseed, 44 bushels; corn meal, 62 bushels; beans, 10 bushels; eggs, 4,000 dozen; tallow, 1,500 lbs.; flour, 171 bbls.; butter, 33 firkins; sheep, 223 head; lumber, 16,000 feet; hay, 20,000 lbs.; barytes, 8 tons. The freight sent forward amounts to nearly 400 tons.

Among the numerous articles of freight brought to this city last week over the Loudoun and Hampshire Railroad were 1,350 bushels of corn, and 200 barrels of flour.

THIRD WARD RADICALS.—A meeting of the Lincoln Republican Club of the Third Ward, was held on Saturday night last, at the school room, known as Siekle's Barracks, W. N. Harlow in the Chair, and T. I. Edelin, Secretary. After the transaction of the usual routine business, about twenty new members, most of whom were white, were added to the club. A vote of thanks was given to Mr. Scott, the school teacher, for the use of the room occupied by the club as their meeting room. A committee, consisting of Justice John Moore, was appointed to wait upon Charles Whittlesey, white, and two colored preachers William Smith and George W. Parker, and request them to address a mass meeting of the Republican party of this city, to be held some time this week. Addresses were delivered by I. C. O'Neale, white, and James Claggett, colored, after which the meeting adjourned until next Saturday night.

BUTTER.—Housekeepers and others will be pleased to know that butter, which has "ruled" so high for some time past, has, in commercial parlance, received "a check," and "tumbled." The receipts are very large, and the stock, on hand greatly in excess of the demand, which is very limited just now—quality prime. The pastures all through the country are fine, and it is probable that a very large quantity of butter will be made. A choice article will not now command over 20 cents by the quantity, and a still further decline is predicted. One commission house in this place has now on hand upwards of five thousand pounds of fresh country butter, and greater or less quantities are held by many.

WOOL.—Besides the regular demand for this article in this market, several agencies have recently been established here for its purchase, and the prices paid are equal to those quoted in Baltimore. The farmers in the upper country, especially along the lines of the railroads, who are extensively engaged in sheep raising, will bear this in mind, and may rest assured that they can always find a ready market here, at prices that will compare most favorably with those of the Northern markets. A correct list of quotations for the various descriptions, will always be found in our report of the market.

COUNTY LEVY.—All the magistrates having been summoned to attend the present term of the Court, to make a County Levy, a committee composed of Messrs. Bell, White, Harmon, Beach and Johnson, was appointed to report upon the indebtedness of the county, the accounts, &c., and having examined and certified the accounts as far as reported, and the Commissioner of the Revenue not having a list of the tithables ready, and the committee being unable to report without it, the levy has been postponed until the next term of the Court.

LEG FRACTURED.—Mr. Elkanna Weir, employed in the lumber yard of Mr. L. D. Harmon, was accidentally thrown from the wagon he was driving, about ten o'clock this morning, opposite the freight depot of the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, known as the Brown Shed, and one of the wheels passing over his left leg fractured it, just above the ankle. He was taken into the depot, properly attended to, and sent on a sofa to his home in the First Ward. Dr. W. B. Gregory rendered the necessary surgical assistance.

BASE BALL.—The Young America Base Ball Club of this city, played their second match of the season on Saturday, the 1st inst., at 2 o'clock, with the Atlantic, on their grounds, near the residence of Mrs. Mason. The match resulted in a victory for the former, by a score of 20 to 19. Umpire, W. K. Davidson; Scorers, Samuel Price and Robert Wheat.

STALL LEFT OPEN.—The butchers stall of Michael Schuler, in the new market, was left open on Saturday night, and remained so until yesterday evening, when its condition was discovered and the owner informed of it. Persons should be more careful now than ever, in consequence of the number of thieves always on the look out.

CIRCUIT COURT.—(SATURDAY.)—Alexandria Water Company vs. Edward S. Hough—in chancery. This cause was continued for the report of the Commissioner in Chancery. Wm. Fowler's executors vs. Wm. Fowler's devisees—in chancery. The report of Commissioner Yeaton was confirmed, with this modification: That the widow of George D. Fowler is to be allowed her dower, in the full share of her husband's, in the real estate of his father, Wm. Fowler, deceased.

Wm. Fowler's executors vs. Wm. Fowler's devisees—in chancery. The report of Commissioners Johnston, Burke and Yeaton, was confirmed, and L. B. Taylor and G. W. Brent were appointed Commissioners to convey the real estate allotted to the parties by the said Commissioners.

Issue Newton vs. John Nagler, Jr., and others—in chancery. A final decree was made in this cause—judgment suspended for sixty days. Edward Stabler's administrator vs. Jonathan Butcher, et al.—in chancery. A decree was made in this cause.

Edgar S. Hutchinson vs. Maris Taylor—in chancery. This cause was recommended to a Commissioner in Chancery.

Wm. Argue, surviving executor of John Reed vs. the Orange and Alexandria Railroad Company—in debt. It was considered by the Court that the plaintiff recover against the defendant the sum of \$716, with interest from May 25th, 1867, till paid and costs.

John Clarke, a white man, charged with felony, and who was found guilty at the first part of the term, was granted a new trial. Court adjourned till Court in course.

COUNTY COURT.—The June term of the County Court commenced its session this morning. Licenses to keep ordinaries were granted to Norman Laws, Terry Ryan, Anthony Dwyer, Adam Wentzel, James Butler, John Seaton, Edwin Carlin. Licenses to sell Liquors by Retail was granted to Messrs. Sisson & Taylor. License to keep an ordinary was refused to George Smith and Mattie Trice. A negro man, named Green, committed on a charge of stealing meat from James Quinn, was examined and discharged, having already been confined for more than a month. D. L. Smoot for the prosecution, C. E. Stuart for prisoner.

In the absence of the Commonwealth's Attorney, David L. Smoot, Esq., was appointed to act in his place.

SHIPPING.—The Southerly winds, prevailing yesterday, brought to this city more vessels than have arrived here in any one day for a long time past. They commenced coming up about the middle of the day and continued to arrive in an uninterrupted line until night fall. At one time in the evening there were lying off the American Company's Coal depot, twenty-four schooners averaging two hundred and fifty tons burden, and one square rigged vessel.

The steamers H. Livingston, Capt. Lawler, and the Columbia, Captain Harper, arrived yesterday on time, with full freight and passenger lists. The Kennebec, Captain Wilson, to whose kindness this office is indebted for many favors, arrived up on Saturday night, from Baltimore and the Potomac Landings, with a heavy freight and a full complement of passengers.

FRESH—DAMAGE TO RAILROADS.—The heavy rain of last night caused an overflow of the banks of the various streams in the upper country, and the consequent washing of the tracks of the railroads crossing them. On the Orange and Alexandria Railroad the trestle work over Craig's run, near Beaton Station, and over Owl run, near Warrenton Junction, was damaged, and some little injury caused to a locomotive at the former. A slight delay to the running of the trains was occasioned, but the damage has already been repaired, and the trains will run on regular time to-morrow. On the Virginia Central Railroad a trestle work, near Gordonsville, was washed away, but we learn that that too has been repaired.

FIREMEN'S MEETING.—The meeting of the Friendship Fire Company, to be held to-night, see notice in another column, is for the purpose of determining whether to accept the terms of agreement proposed for the future government of the Firemen's Convention.—The San and Hydraulic Companies will hold meetings for a similar purpose to-morrow night.

COAL TRADE.—The repairs to the bridge on the Cumberland and Pennsylvania Railroad having been completed, coal will be brought into Cumberland to-day, and boats for this city will commence loading there to-morrow morning. Coal is wanted here now, as many vessels are in port awaiting cargoes.

MAYOR LATHAM has gone to Annapolis, the City Council on Saturday last having appointed him proxy, to represent the city's stock in the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, at the annual meeting of the Stockholders of that Company, which is now in progress in that city to-day.

OYSTERS.—Mr. John Phillips sent to this office this morning a barrel of Smith's Creek oysters, as plump and sound as the generality of oysters are in the winter. He has several more barrels at his office, on King street wharf.

TEMPERANCE MEETING.—The temperance meeting, to have been held yesterday evening in the Market Square, was postponed, in consequence of the unfavorable weather.

FLOWER GARDENS PILLAGED.—Several flower gardens, in different sections of the city, have of late been entered surreptitiously and robbed of their choicest plants.

FOR LEESBURG.—The trains on the Alexandria, Loudoun and Hampshire Railroad, commenced running regularly to Leesburg to-day.

DEEDS.—Sixteen Deeds were admitted to record in the Clerk's office of this county during the month of May.
