**RALPH T. DANIELS' LETTER.**  
Mr. Daniel replies to a communication made  
to him by a number of gentlemen of Caroline  
county. We have only the space to give the  
following abstract of it, from the Lynchburg  
News:

"He deprecates that sullen indifference or  
reckless despair which prompts us to do  
nothing, and surrender all our political rights  
to the tender mercies of the Radical party,  
and endure with what patience we may the  
most extreme of their hate. But, whilst  
thus counselling us against the dangers to be  
incurred by pursuing so suicidal a course, he  
implores us at the same time not to court  
further humiliation and aggression by abject  
and uncomplaining submission to every behest  
of the Radical party. It is wiser to submit to  
the inevitable, and to resist the encroachments  
of Congress in face of the overwhelming force  
which is arrayed against us. We are therefore  
advised to yield to their demands just as we  
would those enforced with a pistol at our  
head. We then compromise no one. The  
State is not thereby dishonored, and we act  
as individuals. 'When but the other day,'  
says Mr. D., 'a military satrap here at  
Richmond set aside acts of the Legislature,  
vetoed elections, and played off upon our  
fantastic tricks of authority, we had to submit,  
but who thought the State was thereby com-  
promised? As individual men, we yielded to  
overwhelming force, but we did not make haste  
to lay the State at his feet, nor run forward  
with alacrity to take the gages and fetters at  
his hand.'"

"Mr. Daniel advises every one who can  
register, not to swell the ranks of Radicalism,  
but to secure to Conservatives a controlling  
voice in the Convention called to frame a new  
Constitution, and accept the Constitutional  
amendment. Whether the present law be a  
finality or not, it is our best course to accept  
and perform the acts required in good faith;  
but says Mr. Daniel 'we will never go groping  
in the dark beyond that limit for some yet  
unknown extreme of self-abasement, which  
may gratify a fond and irresponsible tyranny.  
We should legislate for the good of the State,  
not for the success of a political faction. We  
should endeavor to place all the rights of per-  
son and property, and all political rights like-  
wise, on the safest basis we can find, but  
should disdain to embody in the form of law,  
for our own government, any of the agrarian  
iniquity which festers around us, poisoning the  
air we breathe; and which, if embraced, be-  
sides its unpeppable humiliation, would entail  
evils compared with which the continued rule  
of the sword, in tolerably merciful hands,  
would be a positive good.'"

With regard to confiscation Mr. D. thinks  
there is little danger of the consummation of  
any such act. Self-preservation will array  
against it all the property men of the North,  
who already scent anarchy in the breeze, and  
with the proverbial instinct of sensitive capi-  
talists, seek to suppress and discourage the  
suggestion.

We will close our notice of this letter of Mr.  
Daniel, with the following extract:

"Why, we know something of 'reconstructed'  
States. Look at Western Virginia where a  
profligate minority in possession of the govern-  
ment perpetuates its power by driving out  
with the aid of test-oaths, disfranchisement  
and punitive laws, all the worth and intelli-  
gence of the population. Look at Tennessee,  
whose ruffian Governor keeps twenty thousand  
troops in the field, 'how long, depends on the  
conduct of the people.' These States have  
representatives in Congress. What good does  
it do them? Does it make life and liberty  
safe, or property secure? Does it protect a  
single right of the citizen against the most gal-  
lopping oppressions? These, then, are the threat-  
ened evils, to which I prefer a tolerably merciful  
military rule—the principle of confiscation  
by taxation embodied in the organic law—the  
power of taxation—the power of political dis-  
franchisement—and all the general powers of  
legislation vested in a 'reconstructed' com-  
munity, from which will be excluded the real peo-  
ple, with whatever of virtue, worth and intelli-  
gence remains in the land. I am not so in  
love with the company to be met with in Con-  
gress, and to say the truth, with the sort of  
members we should be obliged to send there,  
under these conditions, would be worth the  
price we should pay for it."

**THE SUN AT MIDNIGHT.**—Mr. Campbell  
went far enough North in Norway to see the  
sun at midnight. It was in sixty-nine degrees  
north latitude. The party stood on a cliff,  
1,000 feet above the Arctic sea. The description  
was: "The ocean stretched away in  
silent vastness; at our feet; the sound of its  
waves scarcely reached our airy lookout; away  
in the north the huge old sun swung low along  
the horizon, like the slow beat of the pendu-  
lum in the tall clock in our grandfather's par-  
lor corner. We all stood silent, looking at our  
watches."

"When both hands came together at 12,  
midnight, the full round orb hung triumphantly  
above the wave—a bridge of gold running  
due north spanned the waters between us and  
him. There he shone in silent majesty which  
knew no setting. We involuntarily took off  
our hats; no word was said. Combine, if you  
can, the most brilliant sunset and sunrise you  
ever saw, and its beauties will pale before the  
gorgeous coloring which now lit up ocean,  
gorgeons, and mountain. In half an hour the  
sun had swung up perceptibly on his beat, the  
colors changed to those of morning, a fresh  
breath rippled over the flood, one songster after  
another piped up in the grove behind us—we  
had slid into another day."
