FINE STOCK COMING TO VIRGINIA.—We
copy the following from a Philadelphia paper:
"Yesterday Mr. James Gowen, of Mount
Airy, forwarded to western Virginia seven fine
young Durhams from his herd. The lot con-
sisted of two splendid young cows and their
two calves, five months old respectively; also,
two yearlings, a bull and heifer, and a two-
year-old bull. All the cattle were of remark-
able size for their age, and highly creditable to
their experienced breeder.

We learn upon inquiry that five of these
splendid young cattle were purchased by Wm.
H. Macfarland, of this city, and have safely
reached his estate in Greenbrier county—two
others by a gentleman of Orange county—
James Gowen, of Mount Airy, Pa., the
enlightened, public spirited and liberal gen-
tleman, who, for thirty years or more, has de-
voted himself heart and soul to the agricultural
interests of his adopted country, upon the
close of the war turned his attention to de-
vastated Virginia, a State he has always admired
and loved, and with a noble liberality placed
at the disposal of Gen. Richardson, his herd of
thoroughbred young Durham cattle, more
than thirty in number, to be given to such
persons as in his opinion might be relied upon
to keep them in good condition, and to hold them
subject to the joint use of themselves and their
neighbors. Or, if any were unwilling to re-
ceive upon these conditions, Gen. R.
authorized to sell to such persons upon their
own terms as to price and time of payment.—
Nearly all this fine stock has consequently come
to Virginia—some by donation, some by pur-
chase. The remainder, seven or eight in num-
ber, Mr. Gowen holds subject to any further
call from this State, to which he particularly
desires that they shall come for the improve-
ment of the stock which was lost by the war,
and declines selling them, except to this or
some other Southern State. We hear from
Gen. R. of several munificent donations by the
same gentleman to persons in Virginia.—Rich-
mond Whig.

REGISTRATION.—It is due to truth to say
that the disinclination to register produced in
many minds, has been increased by the menace
of prosecutions for perjury adultery held
before us, and the fact that our au-
thorities who have control over this subject
registration owe it to good faith and fair deal-
ing to give those who have been thus intimi-
dated the assurance that they will not be re-
garded as committing perjury, to satisfy their
scruples, and give them another opportunity
to register.

We feel that we have some right to be heard
on this subject. We have upheld the good
faith of Congress in the matter of the recon-
struction laws, and relying upon it, have steady-
ly and under trying circumstances advocated
an unquestioning acquiescence in all the terms
and conditions of these laws. Under such cir-
cumstances it is mortifying and discouraging to
see the great work for which we have toiled,
spoiled and defeated by an unworthy device—
a piece of knavery which no respectable party
could tolerate. We refer to the intimidating
circular which has been industriously distrib-
uted broadcast over Virginia.—Rich. Whig.

A MADMAN IN A RAILWAY TRAIN.—The
Salut Public describes a fearful scene which
took place a few days ago, between (theaters of
Blaisy and Dijon, in a third class carriage
of a train on its way from Paris to Lyons.—
Among the passengers were three foreigners,
supposed to be natives of Flanders, who had
been conversing in their own language during
the earlier part of the journey. About eleven
at night the majority of the travellers were
dozing, when suddenly the silence was broken
by one of the strangers, who, waking up in a
state of raving madness, broke into the most
horrible cries, and falling upon his fellow
passengers, commenced striking and biting
them right and left. A man named, in which
the travellers climbed over the partition into
the adjoining compartment, followed by the
madman, still striking and biting those he
could reach. Some persons, in their terror,
opened the door and took refuge on the ledge
outside, although the train was going at full
speed. At length a Zouave closed with the
lunatic, and succeeded in pushing him out of
the door.

THE LATE CONFEDERATE ARMY.—We give
an abstract of the returns of all the armies of the
Confederacy for nearly every month from the
beginning of 1862 down to the beginning of
1864—the entire active period of the war, sav-
ing a few weeks at the close. The greatest
number actually bore at any one time on their
muster-rolls was 550,000, and this was only
when every male from seventeen to fifty was
enrolled in the army. Half a million is the
most nominally enrolled at any other period.—
The greatest number present for duty at any
one time, and that for only a brief period, was
300,000; to which should probably be added a
few thousand rangers, partisans, and bushwack-
ers. There were not three periods of a month
when they had 250,000. The Army of North-
ern Virginia, under Lee, was the great strength
of the Confederacy. At only three periods did
it for a month number 100,000 men present for
duty.—New York Tribune.

COMPLIMENTS OF THE SEASON.—A lady and
gentleman, moving in opposite directions, met
each other yesterday on the side walk of Main
street near the entrance of Liberty warehouse.
The lady wore a capacious crinoline and a flowing
train. The gentleman had been indulg-

fell headlong on the street.
