MORE POLAR EXPEDITIONS.—Mr. Lambert

An enterprising French gentleman, "a former pupil of the Polytechnique School and a distinguished hydrographer, has suggested a new and untried route by which he hopes to reach the Pole itself through the open Polar Sea, which is still confidently believed to exist." His plan is to pass through Behring's Straits, and instead of pushing eastward, as former navigators have done, to make directly north on a little island that he saw the open sea before him. But whether practicable or not, the scheme is to be tried. Fifty of the most illustrious names in France are appended to a recommendation of it. Private subscriptions have been called for, and the Government being appealed to for assistance, the Emperor Napoleon has placed at the disposal of the chairman of the Expedition Committee the sum of fifty thousand francs. It is quite possible that if the private subscriptions fall short, the French Admiralty will consent to lessen still further the cost of the expedition by furnishing and fitting out such a vessel as Mr. Lambert requires. At all events, the matter has been taken up energetically, and if the enterprise should prove a success, France—to quote the language of one of the London journals—"will revive in the nineteenth century the glorious tradition of a past time, when such men as Carrier sailed in tiny craft up the St. Lawrence to Quebec; and such men as LaSalle, guided only by the stories told by Indians, struck away from the Great Lakes, came upon the Mississippi and followed its course in their frail canoes from the frozen North down to the savannahs of the South."
