CONTESTED WILL.—Yesterday, in the Orphan's Court, in Washington, the contested case of the probate of the will of the late Samuel DeVaughn was resumed. The following report of the case is taken from the Washington Republican. The first witness called was John H. DeVaughn, who testified that Samuel DeVaughn was a free man. He is the son of John DeVaughn; Mrs. Brayfield and Mary Rebecca lived with Samuel DeVaughn. Mrs. Brayfield has a child, three in all mentioned in the will; these lived near Potomac. Mrs. Mitchell, one of the deponents is dead. Miss Mary Rebecca has a living child; she never was married.

Mr. Thompson was willing that the door of justice should be wide open, but thought that Mrs. Brayfield's children had nothing to do with the probate of this will. Judge Moore urged that all matters relating to the relations of the testator were proper subjects of investigation in adjudicating upon the probate of a will, and quoted Gill and Johnson's Reports as sustaining this view. Judge Hughes argued that the illegitimate child of Miss Brayfield, was a circumstance from which it might be inferred that she did not stand very high in the affection and respect of the testator.

Mr. Thompson said that the will proved his affection for her. She ministered to his dying moments. Judge Moore said that the witness had visited him just before his death.

Mr. Thompson had understood that he cupped his uncle, but did not leave the house until 2 1/2 his pay. Mr. DeVaughn resumed his testimony. Witness cupped and leached the testator a short time before his death. Witness did not wish to charge for this service, but Miss Brayfield made him take payment. There was no cause of difference between the testator and any of the living persons named in the will, and the testator was in Maryland, witness lives in Alexandria, as his father does. His father has been in Washington about nine weeks. He was in court when the will was first brought in, but has never been there since Miss Brayfield testified on the Monday after the testator's death, that her uncle had left a perfect will, and also that he had left his property.
