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RADICAL ORGANIZATION IN VIRGINIA.
The New York Tribune, in a recent review of the condition and prospects of Radicalism in Virginia, congratulated its readers upon the thorough organization of the friends of that party in every county in the State, and stated that there had been a society organized in every magisterial district. We do not think there is a particle of exaggeration in this assertion, and we believe that emissaries, moving through the State, are actively engaged in organizing a secret association of black in almost every county. From these associations all white men are excluded; and although the female blacks are encouraged to attend ordinary political meetings of the freedmen, they are excluded from these secret associations of their race.

In one of the counties of tide-water Virginia, these hiring emissaries of the Radical party were from Philadelphia, who travelled from one magisterial district to another organizing these oath-bound orders. Before the appearance of these emissaries the freedmen in this county were among the most quiet, orderly and industrious in the State. Now, however, a most unhappy change has taken place in their habits and deportment. Not only is one fifth of their time devoted to public political meetings, but in gross violation of an act of Congress, and an order of General Schofield, they have organized military companies which are regularly drilled by armed officers. In this county the agent of the Freedmen's Bureau has admonished them that their military companies should be disbanded, but when this request was made, at one of their public meetings, it was impudently disregarded, and the moment the agent of the Bureau left the meeting he was denounced by the leaders of the meeting in the most insolent language for his interference.

In another county, also, where these secret organizations exist to which the Tribune alludes with so much satisfaction, military organization were formed in violation of an act of Congress, and by order of the military executive of the fact is now being collected by a commission of magistrates.

It is impossible not to believe that these illegal military organizations are not the offshoots and fruits of the secret oath-bound societies which have been organized by paid emissaries of the Radical party.—*Richmond Enquirer.*

COPID ON THE CARS.—We were somewhat surprised to witness a performance on the cars last Wednesday evening, in which a Federal officer, and a lady with him, took part. They were both well dressed. Their conduct, however, was unique, not to say remarkable. They appeared to be lovers or at least a married couple, not far enough advanced in that unknown county to find out any of its *disagreements*. They were therefore as happy as baby angels, bled and cooed, and fondled each other, and then by way of variety, they had a lovers' quarrel of the most ingenious and open nature.

The row grew out of the lady's lying down on her seat and resting her foot on the officer's knee. He took off her shoe, and wouldn't surrender it. Then she administered to him various affectionate slaps with her hand, and he pulled down her waterfall, and great was the fall thereof. Then she rallied and snatched her shoe and hit him with it on his face, and they both sprang up and waxed warm, she with her shoes off standing in the aisle of the car, while much caterswauling rose from the festive combat.

The car was full of people, who watched the mimic battle with interest and curiosity. We didn't object to their happiness or their love for each other, but we think their exhibition of it was in rather bad taste considering the publicity that attended it.—*Lynch Republican.*

FUEL IN THE FAR WEST.—The Baltimore Sun publishes a letter from Fort Sedgewick, Colorado Territory, from which the following is extracted:
There has just been delivered at this post, by contract, one thousand cords of wood, consisting of pine and cedar, at \$2.90 per cord.—The entire lot was transported a distance of forty-five miles in wagons, there being no timber in this valley. During last winter wood sold here readily for \$100 per cord, and at one time was sold to a company of the 30th infantry by the ranchmen at five cents per pound! These figures may seem exaggerated, but when it is considered that there is but one tree in this valley, (known as the "Lone Tree Crossing") with forty-five miles of snow between it and timber, and to illustrate the degree of the weather) the Platte river, the current of which runs six miles an hour, forms ice sufficiently thick to bear a loaded government wagon and six mules, I do not think the foregoing figures will appear so large.

OLD VIRGINY NEVER TIRE.—McCracken & Bro., Real Estate Agents, are in receipt of a letter from Detroit, Michigan, making inquiry as to whether they can furnish farming lands for a colony of sixteen colored families, desirous of returning to "Old Virginia," the land of their nativity. These people are represented as being able to bring with them about \$60,000 in cash, and "are of the best class of colored people." The heads of most of the families were barbers, who now desire to become farmers.—*Fredricksburg Herald.*
